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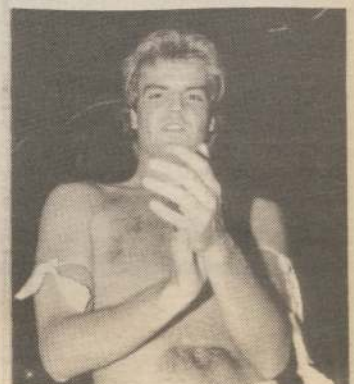
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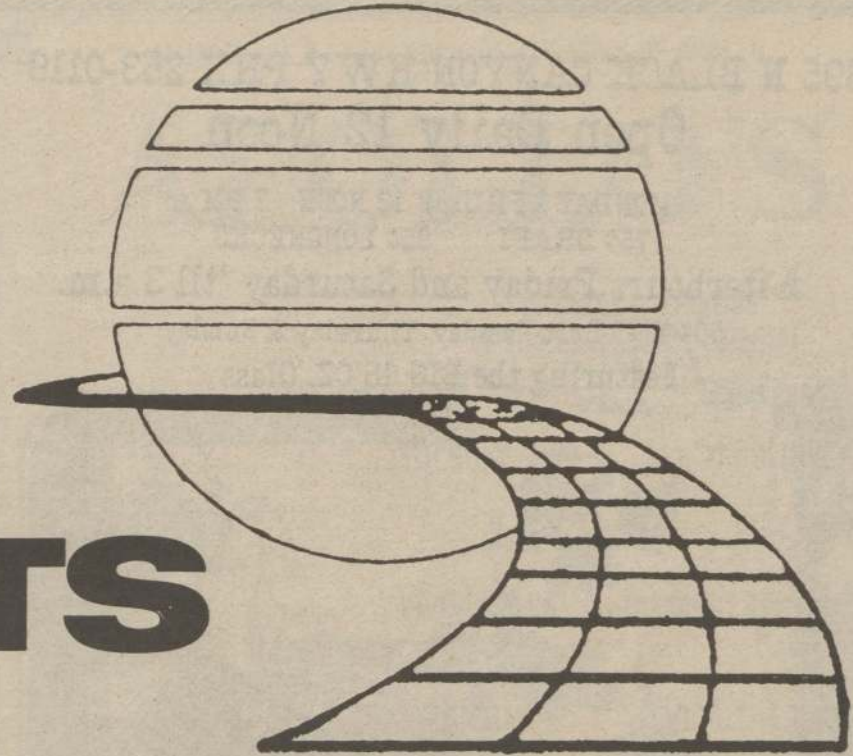




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## HAPPY 5th ANNIVERSARY... TRAX

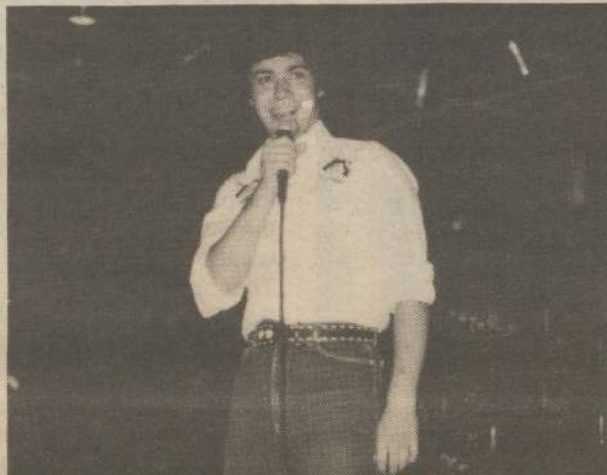


## 307 BIDS "VAYA CON DIOS" ROXANNE

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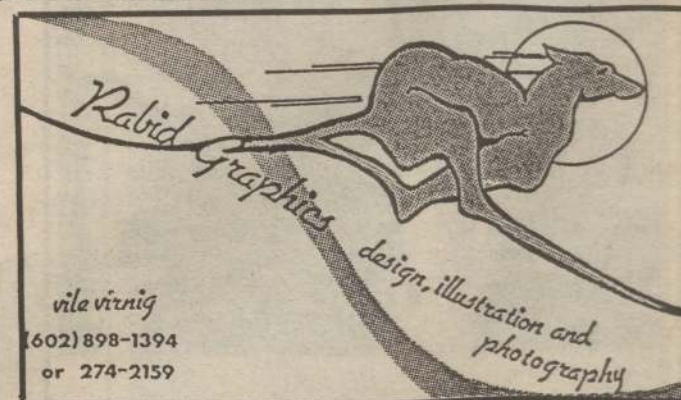
## LEATHERNOTES

Each week as Ron and I sit down to write this article, we not only ask ourselves what to write, but why? Do these articles and what we have to say really cause people to think? Give people something to talk about? Help anyone? Surprisingly enough to some, we both enjoy writing the articles as well as feel a certain responsibility to those who read them. We want to use our experiences to inform those new to leather and masculine lifestyles and learn from those who have a set of experiences different from our own. Men together but independent. This is how we see our leather community. A loose association of men who really have nothing more in common than a masculine outlook on life.

Even though leathermen are independent-minded, they, like everyone, are part of a larger community. Sometimes criticized, but those who do not take the time to look closely, as aloof and uninvolved, leathermen are just as involved in community affairs and projects as anyone. Because leathermen, in general, advocate and usually enjoy a rich and full social life many people see them as irresponsible and whorish. (Well, maybe a little sleezy? Huh?) But leathermen, masculine men, are just like everyone else when it comes to those problems faced by us all. As far as benefits designed to collect money for disease the first Sweat and Muscle used Colt Thomas to attract people to the party by not only using his picture on the Sweat and Muscle poster but flying him here to Phoenix for the party itself. The following year, this past spring, our own Mike Bezio was pictured on the Sweat and Muscle poster in leather and Mr. International Leatherman, Ron Moore, was flown in. A couple of years ago a successful benefit was held titled the Profile Party. That poster also featured a man in full leather. More recently in Tucson the short lived Sun County leathermen had just one party. The Black and White Ball was also an AIDS benefit. All of these events were local and all used masculine men leathermen to represent the event and attract participants. On a national level the effect leathermen have had on benefits is even greater. The largest single event, as far as dollars, for AIDS contributions was the Mr. Leather Contest 1984 New York City.

The comments that leathermen are not seriously involved in their community is, of course, completely false. Leathermen, as human beings, respond as any individual human beings do. With energy and enthusiasm or not. With commitment or not. We are not any different than anyone else, when it comes to the pain of our brothers we hurt also. When it comes to "doing our part" we do as much as anyone. Just because, for most of us, living is just as important as dying does not mean we are unaware. As men we will react to situations as all men do, the best that can be done guided by our individual conscience. Some leathermen will participate, some won't. Some cowboys will, some won't. Each as individuals, as members of homosexuality, our love for life, and our forced concern with death.

The joyful appreciation of life and the great involvement leathermen have in life and all it has to offer should be seen as one of the strengths of our community, not as something negative. To paraphrase R. Heinlein, "life is meant to be eaten in big bites." So Enjoy!



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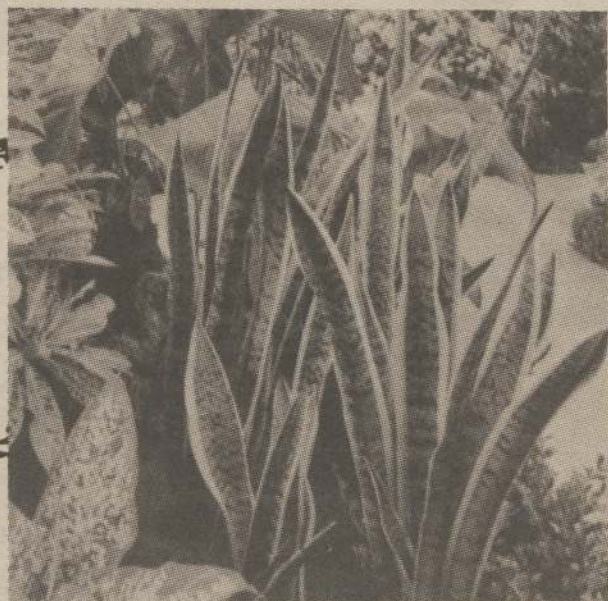
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# SANSEVIERIA



## SANSEVIERIA

### Common Names:

Mother-in-laws, Tongue Snake Plant

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### CARE:

#### LIGHT:

Sansevieria's will tolerate almost no light so they will work in those dark corners and bathrooms you thought were destined for some tacky plastic number. In fact, giving them too much light will cause the color to fade and become unattractive.

#### WATER:

Allow these plants to dry between waterings. They will tolerate being too dry much better than too wet. An over watered plant will go limp, the lower sections of the leaves become mushy.

#### FEEDING:

Don't over feed these plants. In fact, once every three months is sufficient.

#### NOTES:

If you're the kind of person that forgets to care for your house plants — this is the one for you, it seems to thrive on neglect. Killing a Sansevieria is usually due to over care.

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## HUMANSPACE BOOK REVIEW

**Assertive Supervision: Building Involved Teamwork.**  
Susanne S. Drury, author. Champaign, IL: Research Press, 1984. 324 pages. \$14.95 paperbound.

Susanne S. Drury utilized her experience conducting workshops for supervisors to crystallize the material she presents. In the appendix of *Assertive Supervision*, called "Using This Material in Supervisory Training", she described several possible formats for workshops, and includes suggestions for making the most effective use of each. She doesn't tell us what previous education, training or experience qualifies us to present a work-shop, and in fact she doesn't tell us her own professional status. I began a skeptical reading of another self-help book and found an excellent tool for new or hesitant supervisors, and for everyone who has responsibility for creating and maintaining an involved team. Drury speaks to people who don't believe yet that they have the right and responsibility to take charge. Whatever her formal qualifications, her content is appropriate and useful, and her style is professional and easy to read, with one exception.

The element of style that interfered with my total concentration on content is Drury's way of keeping her language nonsexist. She refers to supervisors and their employees as individuals, in both descriptive and anecdotal illustrations. The supervisor is sometimes "he" and sometimes "she", and so is the employee, and sometimes the characters have fictitious names. The gender balance is roughly even, but the random-appearing switches are distracting, and to a feminist reader, not random.

I applaud Drury's intent and regret her implementation.

With those two minor qualifications, I recommend *Assertive Supervision* highly to counselors, supervisors, managers, trainers, administrators and their clients and co-workers. Drury presents a concentrated course in assertiveness training (theory, principles and examples) as each element applies to supervision. She reminds us frequently - but not naggingly - that supervision includes responsibility for recognizing and affirming that personal factors usually should not affect business decisions.

Drury provides possible solutions to some difficult situations, for example how to encourage, reward or pacify employees with different levels of ability and motivation. She gives examples of common problem situations involving employees, employees and supervisors, and supervisors and management.

One chapter is devoted to questions, many of which occur to many supervisors, and concrete, specific answers. This chapter resolved the "I wish she'd talk about..." feeling that I had several times while reading. I finished the book feeling satisfied.

Although not all of us supervise others, most of us are in positions that require us to recognize and implement our right and responsibility to control some aspect of our work relationships. Drury's book will help make that process more effective.

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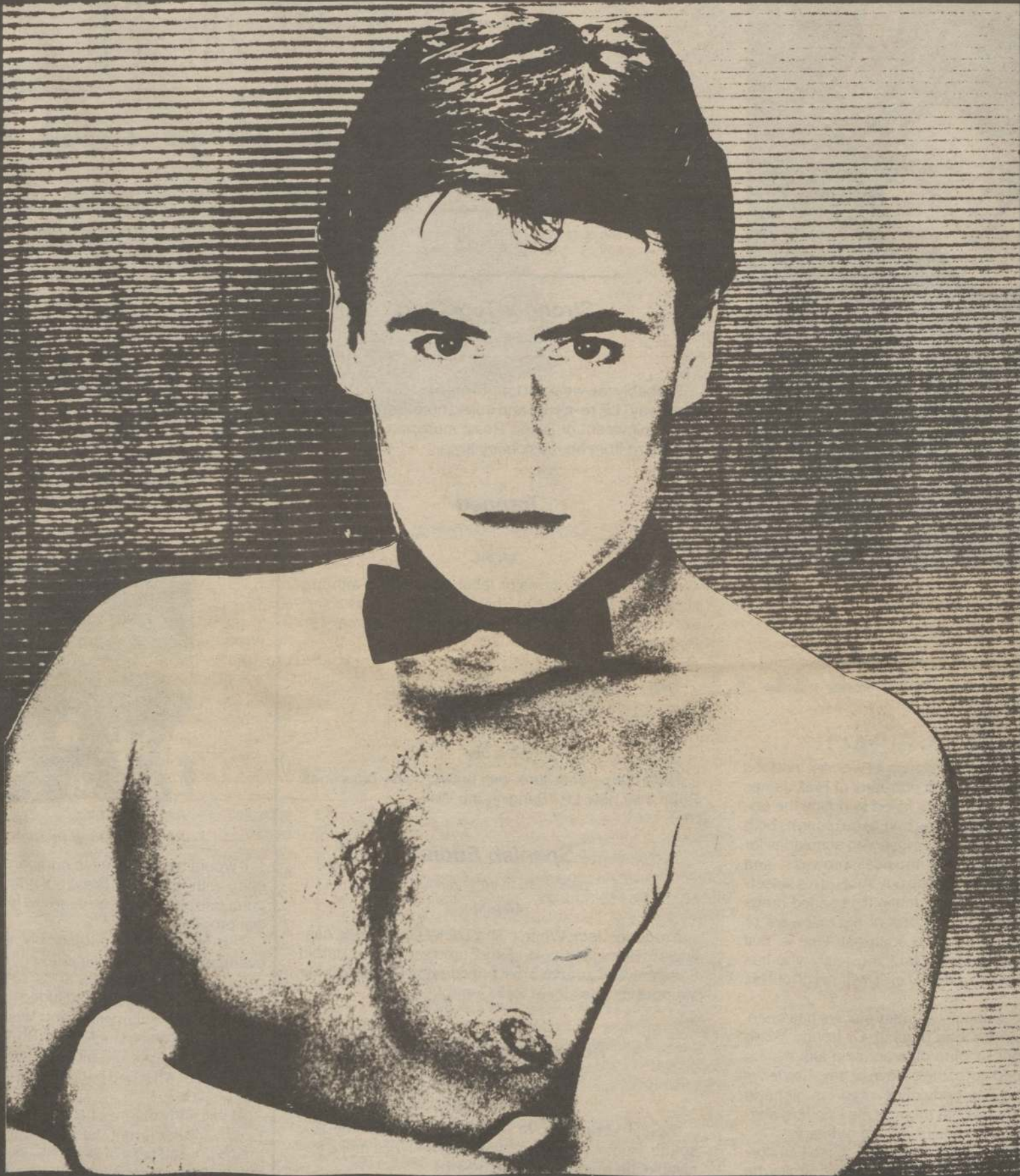
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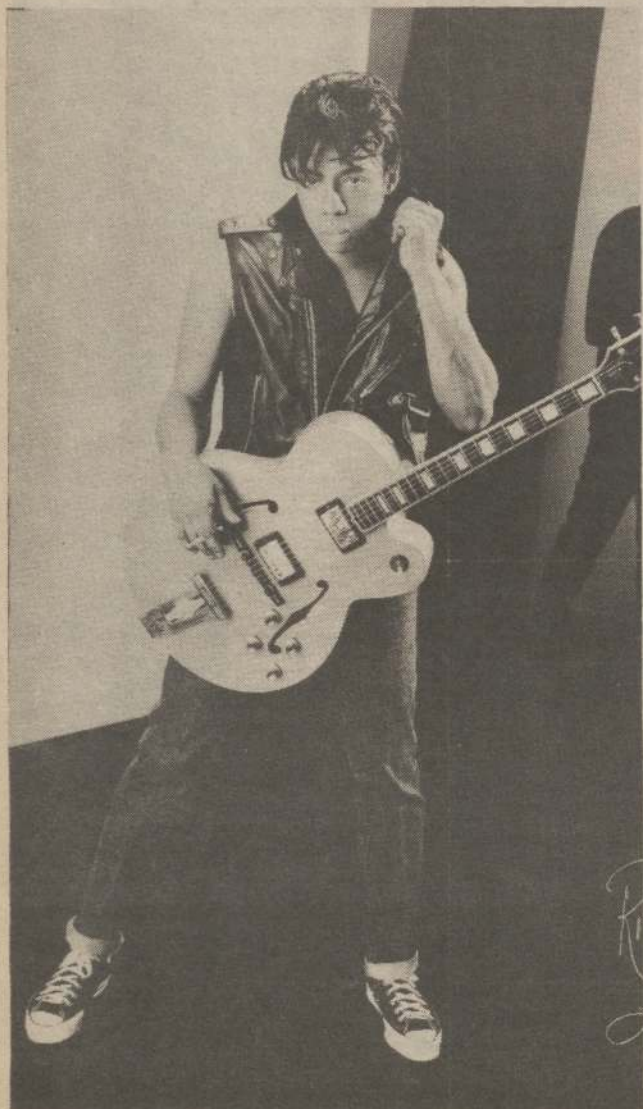
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RICK JAMES

**GLOW**

(Gordy; Produced by Rick James)



How is it, I wonder, that fans and non-fans of Rick James have failed to notice the obvious? While he receives both well-deserved accolades for his musical prowess and cheap pot-shots at his select-

ed hair-style (he's recently traded in his beaded dregs for a permed page-boy), not one of his followers or detractors have mentioned the apparent. That is, that Rick James is the only living black musician who has retained any kind of consistency of style throughout his career.

More simply, Rick James is funky. Always has been. What he has never been is original. Or trendy. While James has brought us nine different solo albums, he has not once slipped out of the groove of, say, *Garden of Love*. So, while he has certainly carved his niche in pop/soul music, he has not brought his listeners anything remotely daring or out-of-the-RJ ordinary.

The notion appears to be that, given James' uniformity and nearly regal standing in black music circles, he is not required to exercise the slightest nuances in his performing.

Fair enough. Given James' exemption from creativity, *Glow* comes across as neither surprising nor disappointing. Present, as ever, are slick's straight-for-the-groin bass beat and light-crunch production. James has revamped each of his none too daring hit singles, giving them new titles and modified lyrics. "Super Freak" has become "Can't Stop." "69 Times" is slowed down and re-titled as well. And, stripped of Teena Marie's vocal, "Fire and Desire" has become "Moonchild."

Nevertheless, while *Glow* is no less entertaining than its original rendering, it is still no more endearing than a brand new copy of *Street Songs*. And, while it's nice to know that Rick will always deliver the seamless punk/funk we've come to expect from him, it seems very likely that we'll survive nicely without a new rendition of "Give It To Me Baby." Consistency of style does not an *artiste* make.

Typical street groove epitomizing the Tommy Boy sound. Humorous concept and clever lyrics make forgivable the much-rehashed theme.

(True West)

It would hardly be fair to compare the Pointer's latest entry with their last. *Breakout* was, in the end, less a complete album than an exercise in music as commercial product.

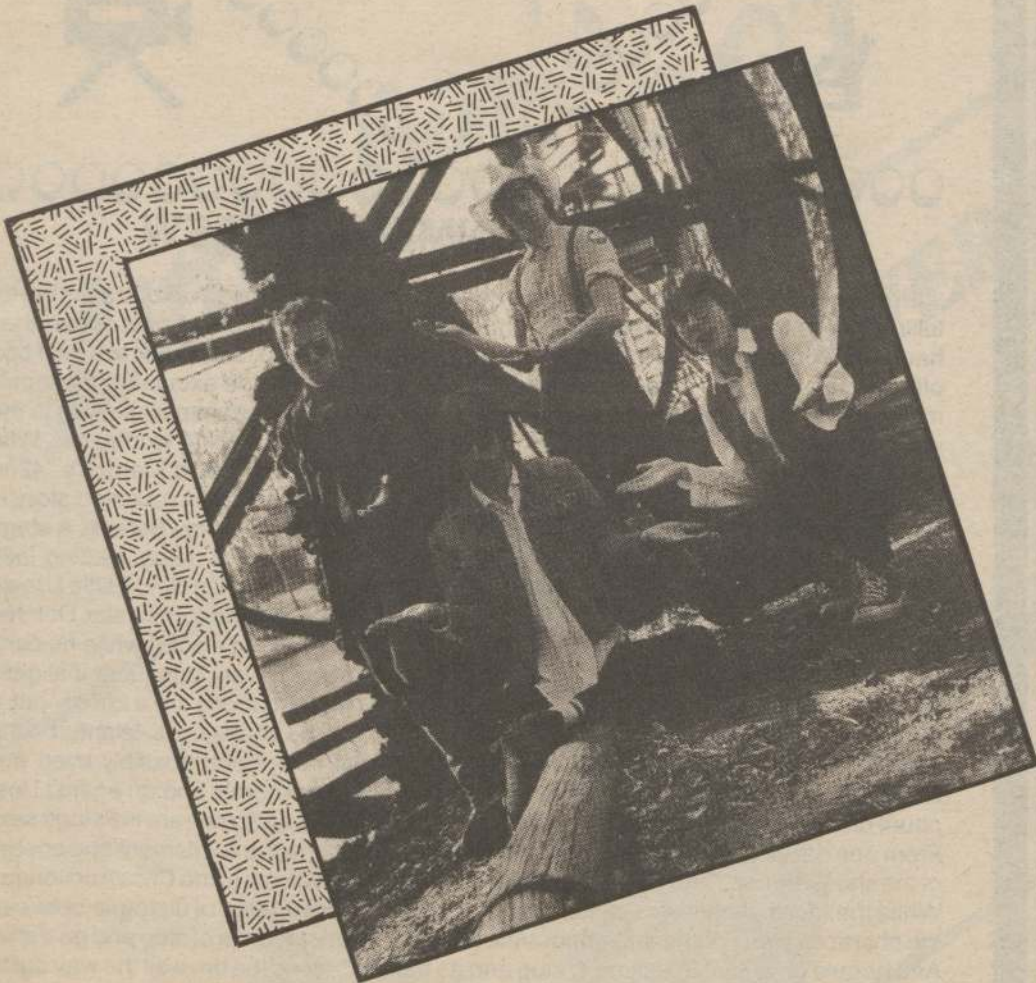
The album, while undeniably the girls' best, was eventually re-issued four different times in an effort to cash in on the success of its single releases. In its second issue, the album included re-mixed versions of "Jump" and "Automatic," and was later re-issued to include an earlier single, "I'm So Excited." In its final release, all five of the album's hits were included on Side One in what had become a greatest-hits compilation of sorts.

At this early date, it's hard to say what will become of *Contact*. In its current state, the album has all the energy, precision, and sass of its predecessor. While there isn't anything here as instantly appealing as a "Jump," there are several strong cuts.

Most notably: "Hey You," a mid-tempo soul number; "Pound, Pound, Pound," insistent disco-rock; and "Dare," shaping up nicely as a hit. The title cut, a kiss-off to the Prince sound, and "Freedom," a beautifully sung ballad reminiscent of the trio's early swing-era sound, are the most striking offerings here.

An album this deep with potential singles and very little that could be considered "filler" ought to wear well over the next few months without the unnecessary alterations afforded *Breakout*.





## MUSIC NOTES

Rumor has it that **Holly Vincent** (of Holly and the Italians) will join the new line-up for the Go-Go's. Meanwhile, both Jane Weidlin and Belinda Carlisle are working on solo LPs... Polygram is re-issuing "The Best of the Runaways," an LP chronicling the music of the band which brought us Joan Jett and, lest we forget, Lita Ford... Don't call the Police: A & M Records has issued an official press release, confirming that the **Police** have indeed called it quits. A live Police album, due this fall, will be the band's final vinyl venture... Governor of Michigan James Blanchard has announced plans to set aside a day honoring Aretha Franklin. This apparently not being honour enough, Blanchard has proclaimed Miss Franklin's lungs a "natural resource"... Coming soon: "American Folk Theatre," a syndicated radio show centering on the folk scene of the 50's and 60's. Guests slated to appear on the two-hour broadcast include Hugh Downs, Peter, Paul & Mary, and the Kingston Trio... An antiapartheid record, similar in nature to the glut of "Feed the World" singles, is in the planning stages. **James Mtume**, who is currently producing Roy Ayer's next LP for Columbia, is attempting to involve a number of entertainers in a recording condemning South African government policies... "A Certain Sacrifice," **Madonna's** much-talked about blue movie, is now available in video cassette form... Stiv Bator, in a recent performance with The Lords of the New Church, nearly strangled himself to death in an over-zealous simulation of a hanging. During an in-concert tune called "Necktie," Stiv is known to sometimes wrap his mike cord around his neck. On this particular evening, Bator fell off the stage and wowed his audience by actually hanging himself during the number. And the beat goes on... Prince has contributed a song to the Bangle's new LP... Don't Be Fooled By Cheap Imitations Dept: Billy Crystal's "You Look Marvelous" is the original version of that song, culled from one of Crystal's most popular "Saturday Night Live" routines. Epic Records, in an attempt to cash in on the song's popularity, has released a cover version of the song... Expected soon are autobiographies from Keith Richards and Mick Jagger... Hit Parader magazine has formed its own record label. Hit Parader Records' first release is a cassette-only compilation, "The Wild Bunch," containing performances by 18 heavy metal acts, many of whom are up and coming new bands... Aztec Camera's Roddy Frame on the mid-70's rock scene: "I wasn't so much into the glitter as the music. But I always thought Bowie's hair was good."

## FABLES OF THE RECONSTRUCTION

(L.R.S.; Produced by Joe Boyd)

Way back when, when you called a band New Wave, the phrase meant something. More often than not, so did the group in question. Nowadays, New Wave is a dated term, used in reference to any

type of pop music which does not employ a back beat.

R.E.M. is mainly a third-generation punk band, who with their album make a rather predictable move toward commerciality. Though their lyrics remain as obscure as ever, and their music anything but your basic Top 40 radio palp, these boys have, with *Fables*, smoothed out some of the musical rough edges of past recordings.

However, while producer Joe Boyd's deft hand has allowed for a simpler, more confident sound, the resulting polish has rather ironically left the band sounding even more rough-edged and obscure than ever. This seems to be true when you consider that, with this newly stripped-down sound, lead singer Michael Stipe is now intelligible above the musical tracks. And this boy is singing about some pretty weird stuff.

Which is not to say that this is an album of strange poetry, period. Always rather folkish in stance, R.E.M. gets in some reasonably diverse if sometimes uninteresting licks. While I was completely unable to translate the lyrics to "Wendell Gee," I was very impressed with the song's folk purity and down-home banjo riffs. An effective combination of psychedelic guitar work and Stipe's sludgy vocals help pull off "Feeling Gravity's Pull," though the song itself is basically R.E.M.'s typical doom piece.

There's nothing terribly new here for R.E.M.; happily their refurbishing at the hands of Boyd have left them as abstract and dissimilar as in the past.

## OASIS MCC TO HOLD "OPEN HOUSE"

Oasis Metropolitan Community Church of Tempe/Phoenix extends an invitation to the gay and lesbian community of the valley to attend their "open house."

Scheduled for Sunday, September 8 at 6:00 p.m., Oasis MCC's worship service will be designed to acquaint the community with the members, friends and ministerial staff of the church.

"We have a variety of people at Oasis MCC," says Reverend Kay Palin, pastor. "The congregation is composed of nurses, sales clerks, teachers, students, retirees, secretaries, florists, psychologists, realtors and others in the work force. 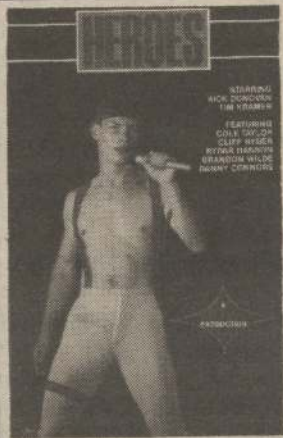

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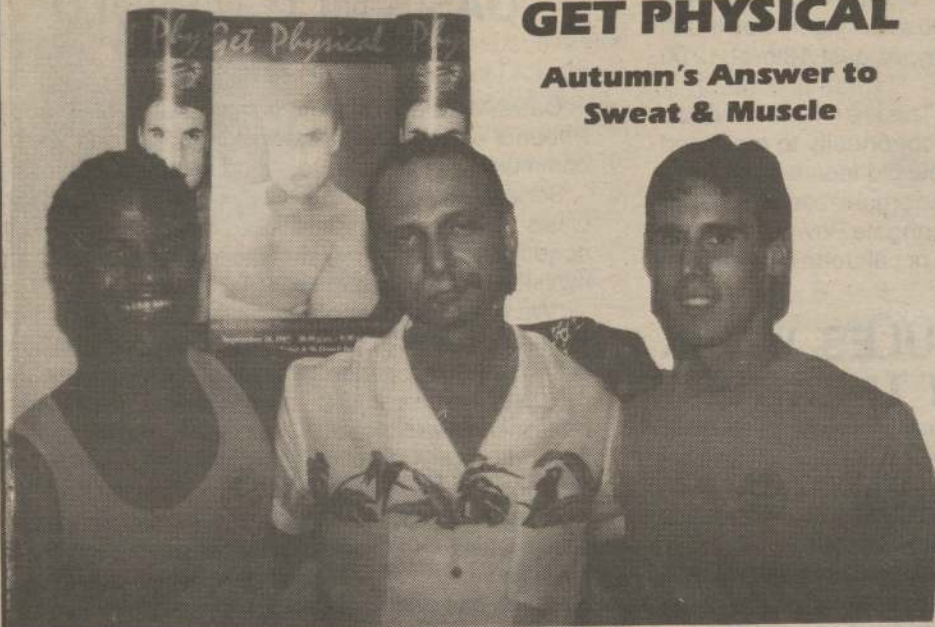
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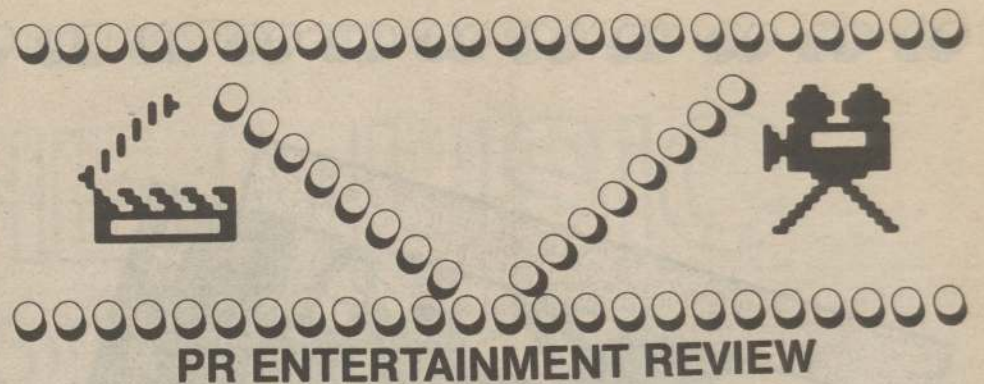

## PR ENTERTAINMENT REVIEW

Phoenix is the ninth largest city in this country. Looks impressive in a road atlas but try telling that to the guys who produce and schedule elaborate roadshows. When they haul their troops into town for a stay they have many mouths to feed. Based on past box office receipts for this time of year, it looked like the only outside excursion the locals made was to the closest convenience market for more ice. Entertainment junkies in the valley have had to resort to planning trips to the coast to see anything worthwhile. With any luck - not to mention ticket sales - the touring company of David Merrick's "42nd Street" will do much to change this lamentable situation. This often repeated story is probably best known by its' movie treatment by the flamboyant Busby Berkley. A stage production is being prepared for a Broadway opening when its' feisty leading lady injures herself during rehearsals. As they say, "The Show Must Go On" and a little known but very talented young chorus girl steps in to save the day - and become a star. Dolores Gray and Barry Nelson head the cast and she can really belt out a song while he can't sing at all. Gail Benedict plays the lucky chorus girl. She is very adequate if slightly lacking in strong stage presence. The musical stage performances are a knock-out. (I remember a time when an aspiring performer had to be really multi-talented. One needed to know how to tap-dance, sing, play an instrument and possibly even act. Nowadays, all you need is a nice pair of tits, the right cheekbones and an agent.) I lost count of the number of costume changes. What you really want to see are the stage sets. From one dazzling scene to the next I could almost get lost in the excitement and energy of the show. Almost. I am not the first to point out sound problems at the Civic Auditorium. While the musical numbers came across decently, the interludes of dialogue between the characters was practically impossible to follow. It reminded me of stop and go traffic. And I would go again. Speaking of stop and go traffic, I braved the drive all the way out to Mesa just to take advantage of a particular theatre that advertised the best of screen and sound. It took about an hour to get there. That was okay because I really wanted to give "The Black Cauldron" the best shot possible. After seeing it I found myself in such a dither that I went looking for other people's reactions. Not a good sign. This is the Disney studio spending a lot of time and money in an effort to capture the magic of their earlier animated features. And as far as much of the background details are concerned they succeed very nicely. And now, in no particular order and from no particular source, the following comments:

There is a very pink pig that looks like she could be peeled off the screen and slipped onto your school notebook. Ditto for all the other characters excepting a furry little creature and the evil Horned King.

Everyone liked the ugly little servant to the evil king, Creeper. Nasty characters are always more interesting to watch. There was, at times, a strange sensation of deja-vu. Haven't we seen all these heroes and villains and fairies in every other Disney flick? And what happened to the music? The soundtrack is without a single tune to hum on your way home. That is not to say that the music was bad. It is effective enough to drown out some of the dialogue on the screen. And *that's* bad. It could have been blamed on the theatre except that more than a few others have made the same complaint about the sound of this picture. The story is based on a series of books that few would recognise and judging from the plot in the movie, few will ever read. A few of the more spectacular scenes had the look of computer enhancement. I found myself yearning for a little "Bibbitty, Bobbitty, Boo." No such luck. With a title like 'Black Cauldron' I guess you can't expect to see dancing hippos.

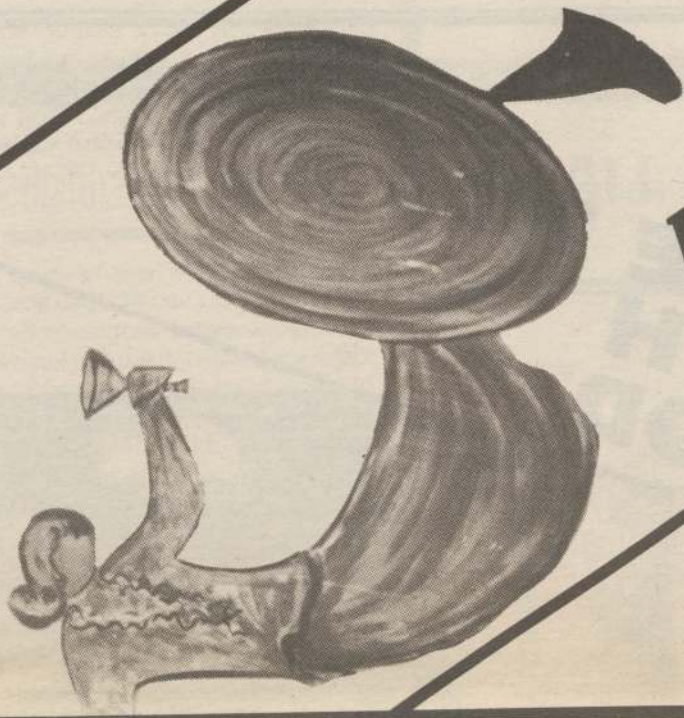

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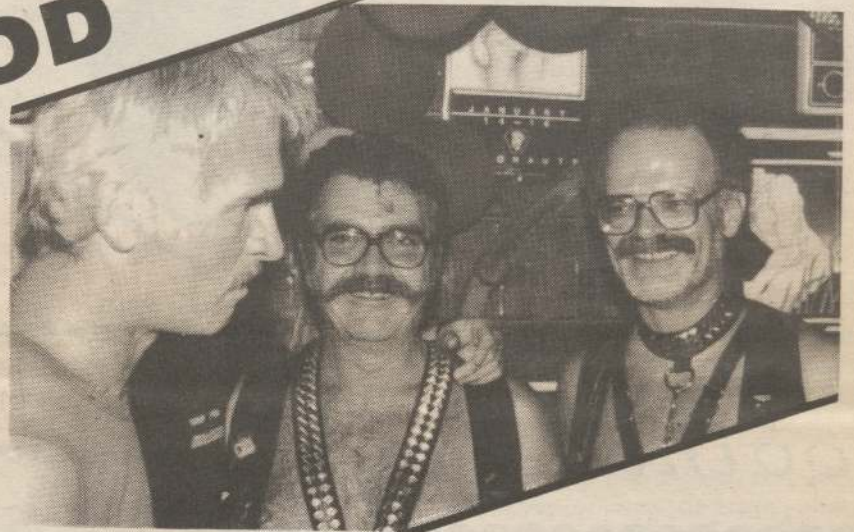
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# COPPERSTATE LEATHER-MEN CELEBRATE 1st ANNIVERSARY WITH FRIENDS AT RAMROD

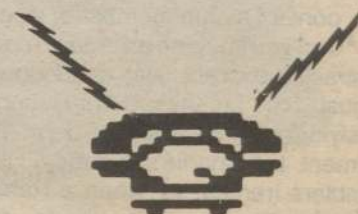
