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



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


### SEASON'S LAST BLACK PARTY A SMASH





The Arizona Gay Rodeo Association scored a double success on Sunday April 18, when they sponsored their first annual Spring Gymkhana at Skyline Ranch near 30th Avenue and Elliot Road in Phoenix. The fund raising activity generated an estimated \$2,000.00 for A.G.R.A., and also proved to be a big hit as a community special event.

A gymkhana consists of a blend of horse events, and contests for people only. Tests of horsemanship, included Barrel Racing; Texas Flag Race; Jumping Figure 8; and Pole Bending. On the lighter side, members of the crowd joined in the fun with participation in the Costume Race, Egg Toss, wheelbarrow and sack races and Stick Horse Barrel Racing. Alternating horse and people events gave the action a steady flow, while announcer Michael Gansen kept the spectators in tune with current activity.

Midway through the festivities, competition was halted to treat the crowd to a dazzling half time display of trick riding by A.G.R.A.'s own Vern, who is known nationwide for his equestrian abilities. Vern's performance consisted of four impressive feats, including a very difficult and dangerous under the neck routine.

A hard fought tug-of-war contest ended the afternoon with a bang. The 307's Floozies shocked the competition by storming their way to a close defeat in the semifinals. Eat your wheatus girls, and maybe you'll butch it up enough to take it all at the fall gymkhana in October.

A.G.R.A. members cast their ballots to select new board members at a special voting booth which also served as a registration table for those wishing to join

the group. Individuals interested in being a member are encouraged to obtain information at Charlie's or from any Arizona Gay Rodeo Association member. New active members are extended a hearty welcome to the fast growing organization.

Following the revelry at Skyline Ranch, the party moved north to Charlie's where a crowd of over 300 feasted on a steak dinner compliments of John King of Charlie's, and an entertainment package highlighted by an appearance of the always fabulous Dena Kaye. Charlie's Country Cloggers surprised Dena with a special number prepared just to perform with her. During Dena's intermission the Cloggers, as well as A.G.R.A.'s Square Dance group, the Midnight Ramblers, executed top notch presentations in which the Arizona Gay Rodeo Association, and the entire gay community could take great pride.

Prior to the second half of Dena's show, the crowd enjoyed the talents of Lady Cassandra and Roxanne of the 307. This time slot also featured the gymkhana awards ceremonies and board member election results.

third; Texas Flag Race, Vern first place, Kenny Cunitz second and Merle Campbell third; Stick Horse Barrel Racing, Randy S. first, Terry Mead second and Danny Torres third; Sack Race, Kenny Cunitz and Joe Raey first, Bob Harris and D. Reeves second and Kim Preston and Larry Carlson third; Egg Toss, Cory Miller and Max Winans first, Bill Hess and Randy Rodgers second and Steve W. and Wen Tidwell third; Jumping Figure 8, Merle Campbell first, Randy S. second and Vern third.



### PHOENIX PERSONAL PROFILE

At first appearance, my profile personality this week, could be in almost any field of business other than the one he loves and works in so well — as his past work record has shown.

George Hill, manager/head program director (which is a new term for Deejay!) at Hotbods (35th Street and East McDowell Road) first moved to Phoenix ten years ago from what he calls home, North Hollywood California. "I'm a native of Chicago, but North Hollywood is really like home," he said.

His first job as a DJ was for that infamous little bistro on 16th Street, (which was the "first" for many other notable Phoenicians), the Casa de Roma. Hill was Deejay for those crowd pleasing "Casa Beer Busts."

That was eight years ago, and George has worked in almost every bar in town with sound systems and 110 square feet of dance floor. His job record sounds like a trip down memory lane — or at least through the pages of an old bar guide — the Casa, the Forum, Boardwalk, Bullwinkles, Sammy's, Farrah's (on Indian School), TRAX and now Hotbod's. He has guest Deejayed at many other dance/music emporiums.

When asked why he became interested in deejaying he smiled and thought for a second. "I guess I've always had an interest in audio/video technology," he said. "It's always fascinated me." He added that he had built his own stereo from a kit and that added even more interest.

"I love good music," Hill said. "I sometimes get moody with my music at home. I either want to listen to it continuously or not at all."

At work, Hill doesn't show this moodiness — his program flows allowing the audience to peak with the music.

"We try to play the hottest music because that's one thing I personally strive for," Hill added. "I feel we deserve the best in sound, lights and music."

Hill noted that the lights are very important to the acceptance of music. "They set the mood and allow the action to happen." He also noted the lights are only as good as the person operating them and he obviously has people running the Hotbod's light

board who fit his standards.

As a part of his job, Hill is also responsible for the staff of bartenders and bar backs. "It's really not a problem, as I have a good staff." He only has the people he needs and doesn't hire simply to fill a position. "My people work hard and do a good job, because I treat them as I would like to be treated," he continued. He has total confidence in his staff. It can be noted that some of the employees have followed George from job to job!

Hill said he enjoyed working with other DJ's in town, sharing his experience. "I guess the main reason is I like to get out (of Hotbod's) and party and I want to go places with good sounds," he said.

Hill is president of the Southwest Record Pool which helps DJs in over 30 establishments in Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado. "We are a service organization aimed toward supplying records to member bars or clubs," he said, "direct from the record companies."

When asked about the future of video, Hill said, "We've only seen the tip of the iceberg with videos." He said it is already difficult for an artist to have a hit record without a video. "Their (videos) impact on record sales is already a proven fact."

When asked his favorite thing about his job Hill quickly responded "The music and getting to know so many different people." On the other side of the coin, the only unfavorable thing he could find was "being called by Action Alarm at 4 AM that the alarm was not turned on at Hotbod's."

You can see how much George Hill loves his job on Friday evenings, as Hotbod's dance floor fills with dancers. From his upstairs vantage point he works hard at helping those people have a good time. "When you see them really partying you know you've done it! I love that feeling!"

Besides his managerial position at Hotbod's, his outside employment and the Southwest Record Pool, George is acting president of the Arizona Gay Barowners Association (A.G.B.A.) and can be seen at almost every local social function.

He has also been nominated in years past as Billboard Magazine's DJ of the year and was recently selected Best Male DJ of the year for Phoenix in the Reader's Choice Awards.





Fiddleleaf Figs have a very low fertilizer requirement. So feed half doses every 6 to 8 weeks. Discontinue in winter months.

##### NOTES:

When purchasing this plant, keep in mind its slow growth (even in high light). So get the sizes you want. Large plants are very tree-like and tend to take on very strange shapes. These work well in large entries and stairwells. These will also grow very well outdoors if covered or shaded from the summer sun.

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
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DARE TO BARE CONTEST

Entertainment. A concept that encompasses a wide variety of expression. My dog-eared dictionary obliquely refers to 'things that entertain'. My thesaurus is only marginally more informative — listing such synonyms as amusement, parties, pleasure, refreshment. A good friend finds his entertainment on a catamaran by day and in pursuit of much baser instincts by night. One need not necessarily be amused or refreshed to be entertained. Accidents at major car races aren't particularly amusing.

The largest source of inspiration for columns of this nature has usually been the 'silver screen' motion picture. This will doubtless continue to be true if for no other reason than there are more movies to recurring write about than there are significant cultural events. (As opposed to insignificant events — which I will not attempt to discern.)

This is an odd time of year for theatrical releases. Not a cinematic void, by any means, it is more kindly referred to as a very mixed bag. Consider this. On the one hand there are the many films released for the holidays — and more recently to qualify for the coveted Oscar. A few can still be found playing here and there, doing business on the awards they did or didn't receive. On the other hand, the summer blockbusters have yet to materialize. The kids are still in school — so who knows what a Lucas or Spielberg may have planned. Comedies are very evident at this time of the year and the Eddie Murphy vehicle sits at the top of the financial heap.

The majority of films aim — if not below the legal age limit — then squarely below the belt. We're talking sex or shivers — titillation or torture. Hmmmm. Thankfully, yours truly didn't have to make a choice of cinema snack bars. Not with a Janus Theatre Company production on view at their marvelously ecclesiastical and eclectic location. (Phew!)


Martin Sherman's play 'Bent' will be familiar to most because of actor Richard Gere's starring participation in the New York production. The story relates the Nazi persecution of homosexuals and in particular one such character's eventual imprisonment in a concentration camp.

Certainly it goes without saying that the subject matter is familiar and compelling. I personally found it disturbing and sobering. And difficult to write about. The favorable coverage by so many local papers must have been immensely encouraging to everyone involved. Live theatre has a close and immediate energy rarely matched elsewhere. The performance I saw was sincere and persuasive. The audience was deeply moved and responded in an enthusiastic manner. The main character, Max, is onstage for the entire evening. Richard Smolenski deserves applause for his professional handling of this very demanding role. My companion for the evening was suitably impressed with the entire production. He especially enjoyed (lusted after?) the 'brief appearance of David Perier in the first act and wished his part had been much longer. The only thing that distracted me was the stage lighting. I felt it could have been handled a bit more effectively. And the distress I felt over the final act was later assuaged by a friend who saw 'Bent' in Indianapolis. It seems there exists more than one ending, depending, I suppose, on where you live. Hmmmm.

For those who missed this opportunity to see a fine production company at work there will be a June opening of the play 'Streamers'. Try not to miss it. In the meantime there are always the bargain shows at your local movie houses to take advantage of. (At least you won't leave feeling too badly ripped off if you don't like what you saw.)



## FROM THE ACCOUNTANT'S DESK

When does a business require a *Federal I.D. Number*? Only if you have employees on payroll. This number is used to report employment taxes to the Internal Revenue Service and the Social Security Administration. A business should have only one number. If you take over another employer's business, you must apply for your own number. Do not use the existing one. To receive a Federal I.D. Number, fill out form SS-4. This can be obtained from the I.R.S., S.S.A., or your favorite accountant.



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**LEATHERNOTES**

OK. OK. We'll say it in print. We're sorry for missing the last issue of the P and R. We really don't have a very good excuse and we didn't realize just how many people were reading our column. Now that almost each and every one of you let us know how big a mistake we made we'll do our damndest not to let it happen again. It's so nice to be wanted.

Now, let's take a look at restraints. For this article we will just talk about the physical construction of restraints and the actual place on the body that they belong. The entire range of fetishes and desires of leather in use and the various psychological aspects of bondage, domination and their more mature brother, S and M, will not be covered here this time but in an article of their own at a later date. This will simply be a list, of sorts, of various restraints, their functions and purpose and some do's and don'ts. Obviously we will not list every possible item as every time we think we've seen it all an innovative customer will have a great idea that combines things in ways we hadn't thought of previously. Innovation, creativity and individuality are keys to enjoying sex. Use all three when designing restraints for yourself. For some, twenty feet of nylon rope is more than enough. This is a leather column though and we will concentrate our attention on the basic leather restraints. Let's just start at the top and work our way down. For some reason I didn't think you would mind. Oh, and if I hit a part of the body you are unfamiliar with stop me and we'll show pictures.

The most popular item at the top is the hood. An interesting piece to be sure. Visually alone the hood immediately creates an attitude in the wearer. The person in control of the situation may decide to wear the half hood, masters hood, or falcon hood. By any name it definitely gives the top a look of sinister intent. Covering the top of the head it continues down over the ears, comes down over the forehead, the bridge of the nose and the cheeks. Being a half hood it leaves the lower portion of the jaw, chin and neck uncovered. The person on the bottom will wear a different hood. The bondage hood differs from the falcon hood in that, while it covers the same area it then continues down over the jaw, around the mouth, covering the chin and finally enclosing the neck. Accessories are easily added to this hood. Eye and mouth coverings can be snapped on. Collars can be added, also. The accessories can be made part of the hood or designed so that they can be used independently. Also, for the head are gags, chin and head harnesses, blindfolds (either plain or lined with fleece) and collars. The hood is a unique and seldom fully used item. Only through repeated use do you find all the possibilities inherent in this piece. As a top, when using a hood on someone be aware, as always, of your limitations as well as theirs. As a bottom be ready to accept the responsibility of communicating your feelings to your top. The hood is not a piece of restraint to take lightly. Especially when used in conjunction with other items for limited sensory deprivation. As with all B&D, use your head before you use anything else.

Collars. A common item, collars are a versatile piece. The width of the collar is dependent upon the amount of rigidity you want the neck to maintain. They can be dressed up or down depending on your visual desires. A common collar addition is a strap which hangs down the back. Wrist cuffs are then attached to the down strap to secure the hands behind the back. Dee rings can be added to the collar to provide area to clip cuffs or leashes directly to the collar. Use your imagination to devise the collar that will serve the various functions you demand of it. For most the collar will be used more than any other single item.

Next down is the harness. Yes, folks, before everyone saw how good they looked in bar light, the harness was used for restraint. Designed differently than what you see in the local tavern, the restraining harness functions much as a construction worker's tool belt. It is designed with fasteners, Dee rings, and adjustments to allow the top various options of body position with his bottom. Another function of the harness is suspension. Designed and constructed on a much heavier level it handles much more abuse. Use the proper tool for the job. Do not "make do" with inferior products or use items in ways they were not designed. If a harness is built to be flattering in the bar do not expect it to withstand heavy use in bed. If a harness is built for restraint do not expect or presume it will handle suspension. There are areas where an item will serve more than one purpose. Just be aware of what you are working with and its limitations.

Moving lower we come to wrist cuffs. Here again, design or purchase what works for you. Wide or narrow, soft, more comfortable leathers or heavy, more durable leather, plain or fleece lined. The most common wrist cuff is the buckled strap. A short, wide belt, it buckles around the wrist the same way a belt buckles around the waist. With chain between the two cuffs or Dee rings on each cuff the connection being a double headed clip they are used to keep the hands together or restrained spread apart. Increasingly popular are two variations on the buckled restraint. A strap with one end slotted and a Dee ring at the other is known as an institutional restraint. A strap looped through a large ring, the loop then cupping the wrist, is known as a slip restraint. The buckled and institutional restraint, once clipped or buckled on, stay there. The slip restraint, on the other hand, must have tension maintained against the wrist to keep it tight. The advantage of the slip restraint is that, in sessions where the bottom is in the same position over a long period of time, the slip restraint cups the wrist and hand and prevents circulation from being cut off. A variation on the wrist cuff is two straps attached together, one which buckles around the wrist, the second that buckles around the ankle. Wrist to ankle restraints are used to keep the bottom in a crouched or kneeling position. Wrist cuffs can be added to restraining belts, (a wide utility belt with fasteners for a variety of functions), thigh straps, etc.

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
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
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## MUSIC REPORT

ROBRT PELA

GRAHAM PARKER and the  
SHOT

**"STEADY NERVES"**


(Elektra;  
Produced by Graham Parker and Bill Wittman)

Graham Parker's Elektra debut is a mostly satisfying collection, returning much of the musical spark not displayed by the artist since 1980's *The Up Escalator*.

Truly toning down the raucous edge of past work, Parker retains his fiery, pugnacious stance. His brittle performance on the paean to Saturday night, "Weekend's Too Short," is prime example of the artist re-evaluating his own brusque approach. A tribute to the Motown Sound, "Wake Up (Next to You)" showcases Parker's romantic side, all breathy vocal and lush accompaniment, while "Canned Laughter" vents a subdued frustration in an allusion to the break-up of Parker's earlier band The Rumour.

With such themes as diverse as religion ("Break Them Down") and Capital Punishment ("Everyone's hand is on the switch") it is unfortunate that much of the album's remaining cuts thematically re-hash Parker's past work. "Black Lincoln Continental" snarls at the record industry, much as '79's "Mercury Poisoning" did. The balladry of "Wake Up" recalls a bit too strongly the tone of Parker's last single, "Temporary Beauty." Likewise, a re-working of Red Rider's "Lunatic Fringe" seems sorely out-of-place amid the originals here.

This allusion to past work generally does not weigh down what is overall a pretty tight package. The album's strengths and the happy fact that Parker is again "squeezing out sparks" is enough to sustain interest.



## DATA

**"ELEGANT MACHINERY"**


(Sire; Produced by George Kajanus)

Electronic music rides a rough fence in this synth heavy era. The genre tends either to dehumanize to the point of tunelessness (e.g. The Flying Lizards) or render a superfluous, too-subtle performance.

Data makes an auspicious debut with the aptly titled *Elegant Machinery*. Fully embracing the synthetic side of things, they present a wonderfully tuneful series of songs. Continental in style, modern yet romantic in outlook, Data re-writes techno-pop standards with clever arrangement and little redundancy. "Blow" is the possible exception, though it's that song's repetitive nature which logs its appeal.

George Kajanus (whose late 70's band Sailor scored a hit with "A Glass of Champagne") is at the helm here, meshing eager synth drive with truly atmospheric vocals. Singer Frankie Boulter's polished singing remains emotive over the machinery of Data's melodies.

No easy task, this. The technical blowout of cuts such as "Burning" might easily swallow whole a lesser vocalist. Boulter holds her own, though the true star of this album is the Big Noise of its *Elegant Machinery*.

**"VULTURE CULTURE"**

(Arista; Produced by Alan Parsons)

Probably the last thing we need in 1985 is another Alan Parsons album. Certainly the last thing we need is an Alan Parsons album that sounds like a Supertramp cut-out.

Ten years ago Parsons' colossal studio productions emerged as fresh and exhilarating, embracing as they did unique themes and probing concepts. Ten years is a long time; apparently long enough to water down sound spectaculairs into runny grey porridges.

Perhaps Parsons might take a cue from fellow studio wunderkind Jeff Lynn (of ELO fame — same story, different band) and beat a hasty retreat for the Early Retirement Home.

## CAROL LYNN TOWNES "SATISFACTION GUARANTEED"

(Polydor; Various Producers)

Carol Lynn Townes has been called a third rate Irene Cara, who in turn has been called a second-rate Donna Summer. It might be noted that, while vocal and musical similarities are undeniable, neither Cara nor Summer have charted this year with anything as blatantly disco as "Believe in the Beat," the premiere single here. Is it necessary to point out that charting pop and urban with anything even remotely disco-y is quite a feat these days?

And if "99 and a half don't do," as Townes sang on her very first single (originally from the *Breakin'* soundtrack, re-edited and included on this LP then 100% is what's delivered by this potential superstar.

Despite comparison with other divas and her tie-in with the *Breakin'* soundtrack albums ("Believe in the Beat" is from *Breakin' 2*) the vocalist and the album hold up well after repeated listening.

Thick with future single possibilities, this LP juggles electronic textures, R&B rhythms and sturdy pop effectively. It looks as if Carol Lynn Townes may be with us for some time.

So move over, Donna, Irene, Claudja, Evelyn, Alicia ...

Originally recorded by Tin Tin in 1983, this version (by that duo's lead vocalist) sports a standard euro-synth backdrop for lacy, ethereal vocals. Charting Top 5 in England.

### "TAKING HIM OFF YOUR HANDS"

MAHOGANY WATKINS

(Fourth and Broadway)

High-spirited, somewhat frantic vocals and the ever-quoted Shannon sound combine in a stirring effort. Nice groove.

### "I WANT YOUR LOVIN'"

CURTIS HAIRSTON

(Pretty Pearl)

Brisk, lively techno-soul with seductive, catchy lyrics. Better-than-average arrangement.

More of the Dead Boys' stylish dance floor frenzy, full of breaks and vocal oomph. Nothing brave or too original; still a lot of fun.

Close in tempo to the Debbie Jacobs version, with a less insistent vocal. Three very different vocal mixes and an eight-minute-plus instrumental ought to keep both DJ's and Dancers "disco-ed out to the max," as the lyric suggests.

WHIZ KID

(Tommy Boy)

Female vocals and a more subdued hip-hop approach than on previous Tommy Boy releases give this record an urban-disco feel. More suitable for the dance-floor than the street corner.

## MUSIC NOTES

While it may by now be old news that Fantasy Records is suing John Fogerty over the lyrical content of his song "Zanz Can't Dance," it has just been announced that execs at Fogerty's former home base are expanding the charges against the artist. Now included in the suit are charges that the Fogerty-penned single, "Old Man Down the Road," is a direct rip-off of the CCR hit "Run Thru the Jungle," rights to which are currently held by Fantasy. The label seeks \$40 million in punitive damages and breach-of-contract charges against the artist. And the beat goes on... The release of a Greatest Hits package by Giorgio Moroder, as reported here a few months back, is upheld as Polygram attempts to license some of the artist's early, more obscure tracks... Wendy O. Williams has joined the cast of the endlessly off-road Rocky Horror Show. Portraying Magenta, a housemaid, Williams sports a few straps of leather and two strategically-placed six-inch metal spikes... Chrysalis Records' co-founder Chris Wright has bought out partner Terry Ellis' share of that company, thus ending what one source called a "very rocky relationship." The seventeen-year-old indie will continue its distribution through CBS Records... Mick Jagger has turned down Arthur Baker's remix of the veteran rocker's "Just Another Night" single, saying that the mix is "dated." The currently available 12-inch is, according to Baker, "basically an extended version. I hear the record is not selling. (They should have) released mine."... Meat Loaf, from whom we have not heard recently, has signed with RCA and plans to release a new album in late spring. Loaf, who reportedly has lost a few pounds, is working once more with Producer Jim Steinman... Beatles Reunion Rumour #17,432: Paul, George, and Ringo are said to be laying tracks with Julian Lennon for that artist's second LP... Tina Turner, having just completed a European Tour as well as knocking off a couple of U.K. dates, will launch her U.S. Tour on July 12th, the same day that her movie, *Mad Max: Beyond Thunderdome* debuts... The jock strap is next. Built plain for the top it maintains an air of control by allowing the top to be fully exposed but not naked until he wants to be. Built with snap off pouches, attached cockrings and ball stretchers it can be a unique source of pleasure and domination for the bottom. Like we've said before, use your imagination and devise those pieces that will serve the function you desire. Make the item suit you. If involved in a situation where your restraint does not work discard it rather than allow it to control the action. A restraint that is especially uncomfortable or whose function is bothersome will detract from its original purpose.

One more time, and we will cover this more completely in further articles, use your head. Be careful. For many too many, B&D is just a new game. 




