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WISCONSIN PASSES FIRST STATEWIDE GAY RIGHTS BILL

"I have decided to sign this bill for one basic reason, to protect one's right to privacy." And so he did. Gov. Lee Dreyfus on Feb. 25 further stated, "I have decided to sign this bill for one basic reason, to protect one's right to privacy. Discrimination on sexual preference, if allowed, clearly must allow inquiries into one's private life that go beyond reasonable inquiry and in fact invade one's privacy."

The bill was sponsored by Rep. David Clarenback (D-Madison). The law adds the term "sexual orientation" to the state's existing list of categories in which discrimination is prohibited. Dreyfus said that enactment of the law does not "imply approval or encouragement" of homosexuality any more than laws banning religious discrimination suggest approval "of certain religions or creeds." In an indirect reference to the often controversial subject of gay teachers, he stated, "I feel very strongly that one's sexual preferences, either homosexual or heterosexual, have absolutely no place for expression in our classrooms generally, and [such expression] should not be tolerated..."

"MAKING LOVE" SECOND HIGHEST GROSSING NEW FILM.

"MAKING LOVE", a sure hit with Phoenix audiences, and a film receiving a tremendous amount of both gay and straight press throughout the country, ranked number two in dollars grossed for the week ending February 17, according to VARIETY. Most reviews have been complementary toward the treatment of two men touching and kissing on the screen. Audience reaction has been reportedly mixed to positive as pertains the treatment by the director. The "Camelot"-ish roles portrayed by the characters have come under much closer scrutiny with a call for more realism in role playing and in assignment of professional positions, attitudes and ultimate solutions.


The film grossed a reported \$1,400,800 in its first week, second only to ON GOLDEN POND, with a gross of over \$2,000,000. PERSONAL BEST, also gay oriented, ranked seventh.

ARIZONA HOUSE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE MOVES QUICKLY ON 'OBSCENITY MEASURES'

House Bill 2510 met with quick approval of the House Judiciary Committee, Monday. Most directly the bill deals with the broadcasting of film material which could be construed as possibly obscene or pornographic in nature. ON TV, represented at the hearings by attorney Michael Green, has come under the most direct fire by proponents of the measure which sponsors a subscription service dealing with sexually oriented films to its subscribers. Their contention is that the service is voluntary and therefore is not being forced on any viewer. Also the matter of whether such a subscription service, through which viewing can only be accomplished by subscription, can be so legislated upon.

This bill is accompanied with HB 2512, reported on in this issue by Roland Atkins. Together, and if passed, they form a strong network of legislation through which moral issue advocates could limit and control both locations and materials they deal in, and locations where persons gather, both for what they deem to be immoral. According to information received, locations have already been targeted including bars and bookstores. Under the accompanying bill, 2512, posters on display, editorializing in flyers and notices, and gatherings of persons in those places which have same could be subject to closure. The bill states under Moral nuisances: "Any place of business in this state in which obscene publications constitute all of the stock in trade, or a principal part of the stock in trade. If the obscene publications constitute only a part of the stock in trade and are located in a place within the business which is capable of demarcation, the place constitutes the nuisance". This, in its broadest sense, but one not to be overlooked, can be construed to include bars, card shops, poster/head shops, record stores, book stores, and any other merchant who provides for his or her customer reading material of an obscene nature as deemed so by the complainant.

HB 2510 now passes to the Senate Judiciary Committee for ruling.

ROBIN TYLER IN CONCERT

Anti-Reagan, Anti-Corporate and Auntie Mame

Outrageously relevant comic Robin Tyler will be performing on Friday, March 26, 1982 at 8:00 P.M. The concert will be held at The First United Methodist Church, 914 E. 4th St. (Social Hall - enter on Tyndall) in Tucson.

Robin is a stand-up comic and producer who for nine years was half of the female comedy team of Harrison and Tyler. They are credited with making comedy history by being the first comics to make women the subject rather than the object of humor. Off-stage, as early as 1971 they stopped a Rams-Raiders football game by running onto the field and demanding more sports scholarships for women and equal pay in athletics. They went on to organize and entertain women all over the world and took the only anti-war show ever to get into Vietnam - and did it all through the USO! They made two comedy albums, their second on 20th Century Fox; three national pilots for ABC Television, and stared in the prime time "Kroft Comedy Hour" in 1978.

As a solo performer, Robin has continued to appear on campuses, in clubs and in concerts both in the U.S. and Canada. She has released one album through Olivia Records, "Always A Bridesmaid, Never A Groom", and will release a second album in March 1983.

As a producer, she has produced major shows, including the concert the night before the March on Washington, October 1979, which drew 10,000 people, making it the largest lesbian/gay show in history. She produced the 7th National Women's Music Festival and founded the West Coast Women's Music and Cultural Festival.

She is Jewish, an Aries, and above all a Survivor.

Robin will be coming to Tucson with all new material. She will give her interpretation of the birth of the baby Jesus; she will explain the plight of a performer with CATS left at home; and will reveal the real enemy in the Billy Jean King/Marilyn Barnett controversy. Her humor is so socially relevant, it is a show that should not be missed!





"MORAL NUISANCE" BILL HAS DANGEROUS IMPLICATIONS FOR ARIZONA

A bill, HR 2512, has been introduced in the Arizona House of Representatives defining a new legal outlaw: that of being a "Moral Nuisance".

The bill, penned and introduced by New Right advocates Representatives Carlson-West (R-Mesa), Skelly (R-Scottsdale), and West (R-Phoenix), would create a new concept in Arizona Law. It defines a "Moral Nuisance" to be "... anything which is injurious to public morals or indecent so as to interfere with the comfortable enjoyment of life or property. A Moral Nuisance is a nuisance per se".

Under the bill, a "Moral Nuisance" is:

- Any place where obscene film (slide, videotape) is publicly and repeatedly shown or possessed for exhibition;
- Any obscene film (slide, videotape) which is publicly shown or possessed for the purpose of exhibition;
- Any publication at a place which is a "Moral Nuisance";
- Any place where gambling is done;
- Any money paid for admission to a "Moral Nuisance";
- The furniture and moveable contents of a place which is a "Moral Nuisance"; and,
- Any place of business which is used for obscenity, assignation or prostitution or any place where such acts take place.

Under this bill, bookstores, bars, baths, and possibly even your own homes, if used for anything "obscene" or where "assignation (making or any act in furtherance of an appointment or engagement for obscenity or prostitution)" could be charged with being a "Moral Nuisance".

A "Moral Nuisance" charge is a charge under civil law, now criminal; in effect, a lawsuit. The charge may be brought by any public official or by any private citizen, who must post a \$500 bond. If the charge is proven in court, the results would be:

- A permanent injunction against the "Moral Nuisance" - closure of the "place" or permanent abatement of the acts; and,
- Leins against the owner of the "place" if costs are not paid.

On Monday, March 8, the "Moral Nuisance" bill was passed out of the House Judiciary Committee and is now on its way to the Senate Judiciary Committee, along with a companion bill which would outlaw sex films from being shown on cable TV and in theaters. Citizens For Decency Through Law attorneys and spokespersons defended the bills at the hearing, and went so far as to show Judiciary Committee members an eight-minute film clip of what they consider to be "patently offensive sexual activity".

If the bill passes through the Senate Judiciary Committee, it will be bound for a vote of the Legislature before the Session ends.

This bill is an outright attempt to infringe upon our rights. It would allow anyone with \$500 to spare to harass and possibly close any business or private establishment that they didn't like. It is very easy to bring such charges and very difficult and expensive to defend against them.

Don't waste a minute! Write or call your State Representatives and Senators immediately, stating in no uncertain terms your opposition to this bill. Also call or write the Senate Judiciary Committee members and tell them as well.

Mr. Atkins, a member of Citizens for Constitutional Rights (CCR), is also Field Associate for the Gay Rights National Lobby (GRNL). It should be pointed out that response to legislators, whether by phone or in letter, need not carry any implication of a person's political, social or sexual attitudes and preferences. Some grow bitter, militant.


They strike back, showing the sneering world that they can be just as hateful.

BOOK REVIEW

SOUTHERN DISCOMFORT, by Rita Mae Brown, Harper & Row, N.Y. 1982.

That outrageous and wonderful author who gave us *Plain Brown Rapper*, *Rubyfruit Jungle*, and *Six of One*, to list but three of her delightful works, has done it again! This time R.M.B. has taken on the old Frances Parkinson Keys/Victoria Holt — Romantic Novel and turned it inside-out.

Set in Montgomery, Ala. from 1918 until 1929 and the eve of the great depression, this tale of survival — and make no mistake, that's what it's really about: survival in the fact of all the repressions the different strata of society force upon people who do not conform to the 'ideal' morality — is peopled with all the warm, strong, independently-minded sort of folk whom we've enjoyed and loved and with whom we've identified in R.M.B.'s previous novels. Strange as it may seem, many of these characters fit the Conservative and Objectivist descriptions of what strong, upright citizens should be like, though it is doubtful Barry Goldwater or the late Ayn Rand would have much truck with these rugged individualists if they knew them the way the reader gets to know them. This is a must read!!

FUNERAL GAMES by Mary Renault, Pantheon Books, N.Y. 1981.

With *Funeral Games* Renault concludes her Alexandrian novels. *Fire From Heaven* was the first and told the story of the youth, Alexander, and of his few close friendships and of his education. It ended with the death of King Philip II of Macedon and Alexander's accession to the throne. *The Persian Boy* told of the whirlwind conquest of the known world, the continuing love between Alexander and his boyhood friend/lover, Hephaestion, and of the love Alexander accepted from and shared the Persian eunuch, Bagoas.

This third novel, as with the two previous works, makes of the limited historical facts a skeleton upon which Renault fleshes out a vivid tale of lives, loves, and power struggles of the leading characters on the Alexandrian world-stage. Upon the death of the still-young Alexander in Babylon, the various factions among his generals and family make attempts, one after another, to claim the empire for themselves until, finally, the strongest establish themselves as rulers of a divided empire: the various satrapies as separate kingdoms. How this all comes about is the stuff of fine historical fiction in the hands of Renault, and her many fans, indeed all lovers of this genre, should enjoy this latest work of the pre-eminent re-teller of ancient tales.



First district Republicans take heed! Do we need another bigot in Washington representing us? Ms. West has never shown tolerance for a class of people who are the way God has created us.



DOING AMERICA WITH BOB DAMRON

HAWAII - THE NEIGHBOR ISLANDS

Our fiftieth state, Hawaii, was once known as the Sandwich Isles, but Paradise Islands would be more appropous! I have previously written about glamorous Waikiki Beach and Honolulu on the almost claustrophobic island of Oahu - and unfortunately this is the only part of Hawaii that many tourists ever see. Of the major neighboring islands, Lanai and Molokai can be lovely, but certainly not lively, particularly if you're gay. But this is surely not true of Maui, Kauai or Hawaii.

You can reach Honolulu by direct air service from almost anyplace in the world, or you can jet from Los Angeles to Hilo on luxury DC-10's. For inter-island hopping, Hawaiian Air, Aloha, Mid-Pacific and Royal Hawaiian offer frequent low-fare daily flights. If you have a week to spare, the American Hawaii Lines' SS Oceanic Independence is one of the cruisiest cruise ships of all time - and a great way to 'sea' the islands.

Maui, the "Valley Island" offers a provincial alternative to over-crowded Oahu. Gay life is centered on the west coast near the charming old whaling town of Lahaina. Hamburger Mary's at 608 Front St. is Maui's first gay bar, but Kimo's and the Blue Max attract some 'hot' numbers if you have time to play games. Makena is a nude beach about forty miles north, where quality, not quantity, really counts.

Kaanapali Beach is just a couple of miles north of Lahaina - a beautiful and very expensive resort that is beginning to look like a new-wave Waikiki. I like the magnificently situated Sheraton-Maui, and for straight dining suggest Alex's Hole in the Wall, Chez Paul, La Bretagne, Swan Court at the new Hyatt Regency or the Bay Club in Kapalua. Camera buffs won't want to miss Haleakala National Park, Hana, Iao Needle, Kihei-Wailea beaches or whale-watching off Maui's west coast.

Kauai, the "Garden Isle", has that rare sort of beauty that ought not to exist outside of one's imagination. A 'must' way to see it is by helicopter, which encompasses sugarcane fields, tranquil lagoons, rugged coastline, and otherwise inaccessible beaches. You also dive dizzily into the spectacular gorges of Mount Waialeale - the wettest spot on earth with up to 600 inches of rain annually. A true 'fantasy island', Kauai (kow-eye) was once the home of the

elfin-like Menehune, and was the only major island not conquered by King Kamehameha the Great.

There are no gay bars in this lush little paradise but you can score almost anywhere, from the beach at Poipu to the golflinks at Coco Palms. I love the Kauai Surf Hotel, and have met some hot ones (frequently Australian or Canadian) just outside my door on marvelous Kalapaki Beach. The excellent food at Kauai Surf's Golden Cape Restaurant shares equal billing with the hunky waiters. Other good dining can be found at Whaler's Cove near Koloa and the Coconut Palace in Wailua.

Hilo, on the "Big Island" of Hawaii is the largest city on any of the neighbor isles - but is still an unpretentious canefield town at heart! Oddly, the best bar night is Monday, when the peppy crew of the SS Oceanic Independence is in town, and everyone meets at the Harbor Lite, 11 Silva, just off Kalanianaole. Otherwise you will have to settle for the drags and dregs at City Tavern or very mixed company at Apple Annie's. I like the Hilo Hawaiian Hotel, which has a gorgious view of Hilo Bay. For dining try Rosey's Boathouse, Kapuna Room at the Sheraton Waiakea, or Fuji Japan-se Restaurant. From lava to luxury characterizes Hawaii's south-east coast - and Hilo offers exotic hotels along Banyan Drive or it's dilapidated downtown, which looks more Asiatic than most Asian cities.

On the westside of the "Big Island" is the lovely Kona Coast, and somewhere in between you may want to visit Kohala, Mauna Kea, City of Refuge, Punaluu Black Sand Beach or Volcano House - a fun place to stop for brunch while viewing eerie Hawaii Volcanos National Park. Kailua is the heart of the scenic Kona coast, and I like the Kona Hilton, where a parrot once tried to bite off my lover's finger. For your dining try Reuben's or the Pottery Steak House. Gay contacts are 'iffy', but look around Dorian's Restaurant, Old Kona Airport Park, Union Jack or World Square Liquors. Sunbathing, surfing, snorkeling, sailing, swimming, golf and tennis are great here or almost anywhere in the neighbor islands.

Most visitors love the Hawaiian islands, with the possible exception of Captain Cook, who managed to get himself murdered here. He 'discovered' the islands in 1778, but a disagreement with the islanders led to his early expiration date! Cook wasn't the last Haole (foreigner) to meet an untimely death here, but I like to think that most people get what they deserve. Don't fret about it, for Hawaii is safe, warm and wonderful! But if you plan to visit Oahu, don't just stop there. See some of the neighbor islands and discover true adventures in paradise!
