RULING PUTS MATLOVICH BACK IN U.S. AIR FORCE

ERA lobbyist to fight conviction


SPRINGFIELD, IL (AP) - A former National Organization for Women (NOW) volunteer vowed that she will fight her bribery conviction for trying to persuade an Illinois lawmaker to vote in favor of the Equal Rights Amendment. "I feel like fighting," Wanda Brandstetter of Chicago said after the verdict was returned. "I will never give up." Brandstetter 55, faces a possible sentence of seven years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. She was convicted of offering Republican Rep. Nord Swanstrom a \$1,000 campaign donation if he would vote in favor of the ERA. A jury of eight women and four men deliberated more than seven hours before returning with the guilty verdict. But the jury acquitted Brandstetter on a lesser charge of soliciting Swanstrom to commit official misconduct. Jurors later refused comment.

Sister-brother defense attorneys John and Sheila Murphy were outraged by what they called the "inconsistent" split verdict and infuriated by what they called "prosecutorial misconduct" by State's Attorney J. William Roberts. Ms. Murphy's voice quivered as she asked Circuit Judge Jeanne Scott in a midnight hearing to throw out the bribery conviction. Scott refused and said nerves were too frayed to hold a full-fledged post-trial hearing. The judge scheduled a hearing Oct. 10. If she then refuses to set aside the conviction, sentencing would be Nov. 7. The Murphys contended that in legal terms it was impossible for someone to try to bribe a lawmaker but not solicit him to commit official misconduct. They said that if Brandstetter was innocent on one count, she should be innocent on both. "The jury obviously compromised," Murphy said. "That's all it was, a compromise."

Assistant State's Attorney Stuart Shiffman said it's legal for an Illinois jury to return verdicts that "appear inconsistent on their fact." But he said they are not inconsistent because bribery and solicitation are "two separate acts." The Murphys also claimed Roberts overstepped his bounds in his final arguments when he told jurors: "We're not asking for blood in this. We're not asking for prison. We're asking for a conviction." Scott admonished Roberts and told the jury that only she had the power to set the sentence if there was a conviction. The government alleged Brandstetter offered Swanstrom a bribe on May 14 amid heated lobbying by hundreds of ERA supporters. They had descended on the State Capitol for a planned vote on the proposed constitutional amendment outlawing sex discrimination.



WASHINGTON, DC - Private citizen Leonard Matlovich is once again Sergeant Leonard Matlovich, USAF. In a decision in Federal court here Tuesday, September 9, Matlovich was reinstated in the Air Force with full back pay and benefits.

Discharged in the fall of 1975 for being a homosexual, Matlovich has been fighting for his reinstatement ever since. He has spoken at many Gay events since his discharge and is classified as a Gay activist. The Air Force can still appeal the decision and as of press time had made no indication as to what its stand will be. Matlovich viewed the decision by Federal Judge Gearhart Gazelle as having wide-spread reaction among the thousands of Lesbians and Gay men presently in the service as well as those who have been discharged because of their homosexuality.

Gay delegates to press ahead

NEW YORK, NY - At the conclusion of the Democratic Convention, Gay delegates met to organize a continuation of their efforts through the fall campaign. According to Jack Campbell, a Kennedy delegate from Florida's 15th Congressional district, he, Ginny Apuzzo of Brooklyn, NY and Tom Bastow met with two Gay political consultants from Los Angeles and Carter campaign strategists. The purpose of the meeting was to determine what role Gays will play, if any, in the upcoming Carter-Mondale campaign against Republican Ronald Reagan.

Campbell reports that the Gays attending the meeting asked the Carter staff to establish a "Gay desk" at campaign headquarters to assist in answering Gays' questions regarding the President's policies and positions as they relate to national Gay concerns. The Carter staff replied that "special interest" desks would not be utilized in the 1980 campaign. They did acknowledge though, that "special interest" personnel were working in the campaign on black, Latin and women's concerns. The Carter staff present agreed to review the request with senior level campaign officials and the White House, and to report back to the Gay Caucus. As of this writing the Caucus is still awaiting a response.

Mr. Campbell indicated that the Gay Caucus also asked the White House to consider advertising in Gay GAY DELEGATES CONT'D ON PAGE 7

News Briefs

P.L.L.C. ISSUES CHALLENGE

PHOENIX - The Phoenix Levi and Leather Club (PLLC) has publicly challenged any and all Lesbian/Gay organizations or businesses to raise funds for the Alternative Relations Center (ARC) \$75,000 building campaign.

According to PLLC, they will match, up to \$1,000, funds raised by any other organization or business. This challenge was raised at a meeting attended by over fifty representatives of the Phoenix Lesbian/Gay community.

URBAN COWBOY - GAY COWBOY ?????

HOLLYWOOD, CA - Motion picture theater owners were disappointed this summer in such ballyhooed big-name films as "Bronco Billy" with Clint Eastwood, "Brubaker" with Robert Redford, "Rough Cut" with Burt Reynolds, and "Urban Cowboy" with John Travolta. These four were scheduled to be shown all summer in first-run houses, hoping to attract the out-of-school teenagers who comprise the largest segment of moviegoers. Each has done poorer at the box office than anticipated, and a variety of reasons have been advanced for their failure.

Most amusing is the explanation of a California theater manager concerning John Travolta's latest film. "The problem with 'Urban Cowboy'" the manager told Intelligence Report, "lies in the title. Kids don't know what 'igan' means. I've asked dozens of them for their definition, and they say they think it means Gay or homosexual. Who wants to see a movie called "The Gay Cowboy"?"

BUSH ON GAY PEOPLE

NEW YORK, NY (GayLife) - George Bush, Republican Vice-Presidential candidate, stated in *New York Magazine* that, "Yeh ... well, maybe I could accept homosexuals in White House staff positions if they were positions for which they were uniquely qualified." Bush then paused and seemed at a loss to elaborate which positions he might consider unique.

MULTI MEDIA EXHIBIT AT P.C.C.

TUCSON - Pima Community College will be exhibiting recent art work by the ten Tucson artists associated with the Community Artists Project (CAP). Arizona's only CETA-funded, visual arts organization. This multi-media show will include drawings, paintings, leatherworking, photography, ceramics, and sculpture by CAP artists Wyatt Anthony, Joan Arnold, Linda Coronado, Joy Holdread, Mark Lang, Terry Locke, Nancy Martin, Gayle Swanbeck and Tasha Turk. "Art Workers," a video film co-produced by Linn Lane of CAP and William Crosby of Earth Labs, will also be shown. Although showing together for the first time, these professional artists have previously exhibited their art locally and nationally.

STUFF IT PHYLLIS

BOSTON, MA (GCN) - Anti-Equal Rights Amendment gadfly Phyllis Schlafly has refused to accept the "Turkey of the Year" award from the National Organization for Women (NOW) saying her selection was simply "sour grapes."

The *Boston Globe* reports that Schlafly turned down the frozen turkey, a Certificate of Demerit, and instructions on where to put it. Schlafly reportedly responded to the NOW turkey gesture with the traditionally domestic view that's made her famous: "Turkey is a specialty at my house. If it was a good turkey, I would have been happy to take it with me, but it would have been hard to take it back on the airplane. The turkey is a very fine bird. I don't know why they're kicking the turkey around."

Perspective

This is very hard for me to write. I find it easier to provide assistance than to ask for it. For those of you who do not know me, let me introduce myself. My name is Jason Wittman. I am a social worker with extensive experience working with drug and alcohol dependent people, street kids and Gay identified youths. For the past three years, I have been working with the Gay-identified youths of Phoenix. My organization is called Youth Supportive Services of Phoenix (YSSP) and it is sponsored by the United Parents and Friends Group, Inc., the formal name for our parents of Gays group.

I am the director and its only worker. I function as the advisor of the Gay youth of Arizona youth group which has approximately 75 active and inactive members. I am available to them and their friends for counseling, 24 hours of every day, via my home and mobile phones. I also work with the street hustlers. I provide, for those who request it, whatever assistance is necessary to help them escape that environment. Usually this means employment and educational counseling, GED tutoring, crisis counseling and for the younger ones, who are usually runaways and castaways finding them foster parents. Yes, those ads you have seen in the AGN for permanent jobs and foster parents for Gay youths are mine. Our foster parent program requires me to screen the potential parents to make sure that they will provide room and board and loving concern and that they will not make any sexual demands on the youth. I also have to match parents to youths, provide weekly counseling follow-up sessions, and get forms signed by the youth's parents allowing the foster parents to act on their behalf. In addition to all the above, I visit Gay youths in jail, provide transportation to job interviews, hospital emergency rooms, etc.; consult with guidance counselors, probation officers, lawyers, parents; and because of the lack of foster parents, I have taken into my own home upwards of six youths at a time.

My purpose for describing my work in such detail is not to toot my horn for your praise. I get my good feelings from watching these kids grow to their full potential. The reason is that I desperately need your help because, you see, "the rest of the story" is that all that I have just described, which is a full days work by any standard, is volunteer work, done after I get home from my regular job. I have a business of repairing windshields which I work all

day, seven days a week to be able to make ends meet. Frankly the ends are not meeting and I am nearly broke and energy-wise, this is too much for any one person.

My dream is that someday soon, we will be able to provide a facility where Gay kids, who do not have supportive parents and who are homeless, can live. A place where they can get all the supportive services they need to be able to make the best of their lives. It is not their fault that they are Gay and it is outrageous that they have any less opportunity to succeed than their non-Gay counterparts.

I have shown, over the past three years, that there is a dire need for these services and that my ways of providing them are successful. As a one-person show, I am only dealing with the tip of the iceberg, and I am spread so thin that I am not able to do as much as I should to assist those already requesting services. Television is, with increasing frequency, getting the message across that being Gay is OK. This means that kids are, now, and in the future many more will be, coming out at earlier ages. Coming out at 13 thru 15 is not uncommon right now! They will need our assistance.

Specifically, your help is needed in the following areas: (1) to research and write grant proposals; (2) public relations and advertising people to plan and coordinate a fund raising program (possibly on a national scale); (3) mental health professionals to supplement the counseling effort; (4) lawyers to assist both the program and our young clients; (5) teachers to teach the G.E.D.; (6) people, especially Lesbians, to help advise the youth group; (7) people with administrative, business and secretarial skills to help in those areas; (8) couples, either Gay or non-Gay, to be foster parents; and (9) business people to hire Gay youths.

The biggest single need is for on-going donations of money. I have been averaging over \$300 a month, just for food. I have recently been having to tell kids that they will just have to stay on the street and hustle, because I just cannot afford to take care of them. (It was having to say that, that finally got me to write this letter). I have also had couples who said that they would like to take in a youth, but they could not afford to. Right not there are two wonderful individuals who have pledged monthly support of \$50 to \$100. I estimate that approximately \$300 a month is needed to adequately provide



a teaching job because he is a homosexual. Paul and Eric are lovers although Paul is promiscuous. For Paul, one person is not enough.

One might logically ask: Where was an organization similar to the Alternative Relations Center when I was growing up Gay and alone? How many Gay growing pains did I suffer in abject silence? Where was the Gay assistance and information I desperately needed? Where could I go for realistic counseling during my troubled moments to alleviate my personal agonies? Who was there to help me when my parents kicked me out of "our" home because I was Gay?

Today! Now! ARC provides the personal assistance, answers the troublesome questions, provides the counseling and simply listens to those Gays who need empathetic understanding.

Over the years, some of us have totally or partially overcome the personal and prejudicial obstacles put in our way without the assistance of a Gay community center. We have managed to survive with scars well hidden, but not altogether forgotten. Others have been fortunate to have private wealth. Many have had the opportunity of an advanced academic degree where their professionalism has few Gay restraints. However, there are thousands who are presently unable to cope with their new or existing Gayness. Who find themselves overwhelmed by fear, uncertainty and the hateful ignorance of their "straight" counterparts. Unfortunately, far too many take the road of least resistance. An over dose!

The problems of the mature Gays are equally as multitudinous as the young Gay just realizing his/her sexual preference. Lonliness drowned by too many nightly alcoholic drinks. Lack of understanding. Indifference by younger Gays. Rejection. The list is endless.

ARC is attempting to assist with a Mature Gay program which is expending efforts to reach those isolated members of the community.

The Alternative Relations Center was conceived to counter daily fears, personal misunderstanding and public prejudice. To assist the Gay community is it's primary goal. And to that end, ARC has consistently grown and succeeded.

Probably for the first time, the Phoenix Gay community has the distince opportunity to collectively unite in a cohesive entity to assist ARC achieve it's \$75,000 fund raising effort to locate a permanent residence in which to continue its present social service programs, as well as to expand to meet all the needs of the Gay community.

Gay people can support one another, survive and grow. People who love someone Gay, friend or mate, can help. Everyone's assistance is needed. How about yours? Jerry W. Boehm - Phoenix

TOWARDS A NEW MORALITY:

WHAT COLOR IS YOUR HANDKERCHIEF?

Ten Speed

Not so long ago, many Gay people were leading lonely, isolated lives--truly in a closet. Now people are getting rich from the sale of colored handkerchiefs alone. A fortune is being made by the leather shops and the proliferation of sexual gadgetry is unbelievable.

There has been a sexual revolution. Gays who came out in the 50's, 60's, and even up to the early 70's state that they wish they had the opportunities Gays now have. Certainly, people of all sexual preferences are now getting more sex than ever. There is more freedom, both politically and sexually, for all of the people in the country. But is this making anyone any happier? Does going from bed to bed to bed contribute to our personal growth? Are we merely becoming 'narcissist', concerned only with the number of orgasms we can have in one night? One can understand that with all the repression Gays have faced that the desire to express themselves wherever and whenever possible--both their sexual ability and sexual power--can be great. But what do we do when the fist-fucking stops.

It is a cliche, but often a homosexual is his own worst enemy. Gay people spend more time and effort putting each other down, especially segments of their own community they are afraid of or do not understand. How often have you heard a straight-looking Gay man put down a male in drag? Or someone into leather put down an effeminate man? Gay life is so full of plastic people and plastic cliques. It is a life with its own special codes and languages. This is simply a reflection of guilt, shame, and fear. It shows both a lack of respect for homosexuals in general and for the individual's own sexual orientation.

A straight person so often experiences only the superficial aspect of the Gay lifestyle. Color coded handkerchief, keys on the left or right side of your body, etcetera. This can all be very difficult for them to understand, especially at a crucial moment when we would like them to accept our credibility.

These aspects of "costume Gayness" rob us of our individuality. The lumber jackets, adidas tennis shoes, gym shorts, and pencil thin mustache may look great--but what do they all really mean. Gay is good just as black is beautiful, but they can also be bad and ugly. Homosexuals have a sense of pride and awareness, but coming out of the closet is not enough. You can come out of the closet and still be a mess. The new morality can provide a lot of sexual hijinks, but our lifestyles must encompass values, self respect, and responsibility. Without these factors in the new morality, it becomes simply another name for anarchy.

What do we do when the fist-fucking stops? Just meow and purr? Do we get dressed and tuck in our red hankies? Being Gay can be incredible, exciting, and stimulating. But it is not the end-all to all of the problem and questions an individual will face in life. Accepting your sexuality is only the first step; life offers so many other possibilities

publications, and having Vice President Mondale, if not the President, campaign in Gay neighborhoods across the country. Several Democratic Party officials acknowledge Gay support in New York, California and Florida will be critical if the Carter-Mondale ticket is to win these states. Each state has large electoral college votes crucial to the Democrats if they are to offset the Republicans in the West, mid-West and parts of the Southern United States.

The Gay Caucus also resolved to continue to support voter registration projects nationwide, become involved in the Democratic Party's mid-term convention in 1982, and to triple the number of Gay delegates elected to participate in the 1984 Presidential nominating convention.

book review

The Novel Writers, by Emily Sisley. Mosaic Press, Tucson, AZ. 78 p. Paperback - \$2.95

"The Novel Writers" starts out rather vague but ends up on a note of self-realization, self-love, self-worth - in short, all the things that make a truly positive affirmation of "coming out". The characters, comprised of mostly trendy New York Ph. D's who stay in their closets out of economic necessity and tend to over-intellectualize everything from simple affection to the death of one of their cronies mates. Toby, a nursery school teacher and administrator who is married for the sake of her closeted - heterosexual image, over-expounds on her recently deceased husband. It's just that the dumb son-of-a-bitch was so straight! That seems to sum up most of the attitudes of the characters in The Novel Writers - narrow minded homosexuals who fear the wrath of God. In this case the wrath of God seems to be big business, boards of directors of school, hospitals or anything in straight society that can pull the plug out of their illustrious, affluent lives.

The Novel Writers are made up of a group of friends who are over-educated and seem to socialize with no one else other than the group. At one point, one of their friends, Millard, decides to write a novel of his own. The group describes Millard as a rather oafish, likeable but definitely a non-word person (a non-word person being someone who doesn't really contribute to the ideal structure set up by this particular group.) When Millard decides to write his own novel, the theme is - well you guessed it - the group itself. Everyone is totally horrified to the point of being catatonic. Millard is quickly brought to terms by this group of pseudo free-thinkers. Not only is he brought to terms but also cast aside after many years with the group. Cast aside as one might do to an old shoe. Sounds pretty gruesome, right? All is not that negative and much of the book is extremely positive - well, towards the ending anyway.

Emily Sisley, the authoress, currently resides in Tucson and does quite well by this book, especially the way she puts professional closeted Gays into making their own sort of family structure - somewhat nuclear in behavior. Also the way she makes each character react to their own coming out process. Although I felt more attention should

have been paid to the individual coming out process for each character, as well as more information on what makes her people tick would have helped. In short, it was just a little too short. I think that where my disappointment came because the story line characters are so fresh and involve the reader so much that I was ready to learn more from this bright and thought-provoking novelist.

I really consider The Novel Writers as more of a long story rather than a novel. But don't get me wrong, this is an excellent read, and Ms. Sisley handles her choice of words with verve and candor, and loads of insight. This one is surely going to make you think. A great book for someone who places their pocketbooks and education where their Gayness should be.

The show left much to be desired. The only refreshing part of the show was the electricity of Tamara whenever she came to the stage. She knows how to work an audience. Guest performer of the evening was Ricci Karr. Quite honestly, she wasn't on her mark that night. Ms. Karr usually is an exciting performer and I have seen nights she has "brought the house down". This particular night she didn't seem to be able to get "into" the show. Margo St. Jaynee is a nice person but her performances were weak and lacked feeling. She has great potential if she works on her staging. What the show needs is a bolstering, perhaps by a variety of guest performers from among Phoenix's finest. I expected to see a show I could enjoy but unfortunately I didn't. What added to my disappointment was the very slow and sometimes poor table service. All in all, with a great deal of work and commitment, the Unlimited can take its place among the other show bars in town. At least I hope so.

The VIP party at Grand Camel was a refreshing event. Almost every bar owner in town stopped by to wish Bill and Jim great success. A light buffet with complimentary champagne were served. The Grand Camel Club is certainly a welcome and needed addition on the Westside. Surroundings of the place lend themselves to a very comfortable evening. At the foot of the fireplace is a small dance floor surrounded by couches, tables and chairs. There is also a large game room. Meals served are moderately priced and very good. People have been screaming for a bar on the Westside for a long time. Now that it's there, support it and stop complaining.

Congratulations to Bill and Jim on what I hope will be a great success. I know going to the Grand Camel was worth a drive from the Eastside to the Westside.



