I've made a living carping about what I've long considered the indifference of the "lesbian and gay community," an institution whose existence I question in the first place. Up to now, I've chosen to see the "gay community" as a handful of dictators, commandeering a den of disco bunnies who appear more concerned with the next beer bust than with gay rights.

But what I saw at the City Council policy session on June 16 challenged my closefisted criticisms and busted my belief that most queers just don't care.

This well-touted Council session was designed to give citizens an opportunity to comment on proposed

modifications to Phoenix' Anti-Discrimination Ordinance, which, if modified to include sexual orientation, would protect queers from discrimination in employment and public accommodations. The meeting was held at Civic Center Plaza, and by late afternoon the place was crawling with queers.

Apparently, while I've been pissing about apathy, the powers that be have been corralling sissies into caring about how our lives are affected by our chickenshit politicians and about how our culture is perceived by the moronic masses.

And, while the end result was a bust (see Don Slutes' editorial, page 4), I

came away with a more hopeful opinion about the possibility of queer consciousness.

No. I am not back-pedaling. I still believe that most fags would sooner suck off a stranger than, say, spend their free time fostering pro-gay legislature. And I'm still not willing to admit that the "gay community" is more than a well-intended illusion.

But I am eating a little crow. Because what I saw at Civic Center on June 16 was several thousand homos who were willing to come out for something other than free beer and loud disco music. And that's a start.

Anger. That the Phoenix City Council would jerk the lesbian/gay community around for six months. That Vice Mayor Thelda Williams would opt for such a blatant cop-out maneuver, after taking "gay dollars" and being assisted by gay labor in her first election campaign. That Kathy Dubs would have the gall to scold the gay community for its lack of "professionalism"—*Kathy Dubs...talking about professionalism!* That Mayor Paul Johnson *still* doesn't seem to grasp the fundamental issue, that he would ask questions like, would the "sexual orientation" language cover pedophiles? These things make me angry.

I live in a city governed by the likes of Johnson, Williams, Dubs, Frances Barwood, and Skip Rimsza (another ingrate). I am unhappy.

Crisis of Confidence


What happened last Tuesday night (June 16) was classic Phoenix politics. Faced with the most contentious issue any of them could remember, five members of the City Council opted to pass the buck. After six months of intense lobbying, with thousands of dollars spent by the lesbian/gay community, and in front of thousands of its lesbian/gay constituents, the City Council abstained. God, what a perfect spectacle. We have now confirmed that our city government, arguably the political entity which has the most impact on our daily lives, is populated with craven, self-serving hacks.

The City Council's agenda that night was simple. The Council would vote on whether to add the categories of sexual orientation and marital status to the groups currently protected by the city from discrimination in employment and public accommodations (restaurants, hotels, etc.). They could vote yes. They could vote no. They could amend the measure. They could gut the measure. But whatever they did, they would choose among these options, we thought.

In the weeks preceding the vote, with only the original three votes solidly in favor—out of the five needed for passage—compromise measures began to surface. Mayor Johnson told several people during the last week before the vote that he might be able to round up six votes for a measure that exempted companies with fewer than 50 employees from the job-bias restriction. Earlier, he had proposed stripping the employment language out altogether. Community activists had rejected the earlier option, but were willing to accept the 50-employee exception. This, if only to get something—*anything*—on the

books linking sexual orientation and employment protection. Especially as the idea was pitched by Johnson (which included a "sunset" clause mandating that the small-business exception be revisited in two or three years), many in the Phoenix Human Rights Task Force figured this half-victory could be a launching pad for continued concessions by the city. It would be much better than having to start all over again from scratch.

This time with the aid of the spineless City Council, Phoenix reaffirms its repressive reputation

In the end, what we got was much worse.

After listening to more than three hours of testimony pro and con, the council addressed Thelda Williams' substitute measure that would 1) add marital status to the ordinance as recommended by the Human Relations Commission; and 2) refer the sexual orientation language to the public, at the next citywide election (scheduled for September 1993). First proposed by Williams as a unit, the two issues were subsequently separated upon a suggestion by Calvin Goode (now seen as a gross tactical error). The combined measure *may not have passed*, forcing the council to then face the real issue. Separated, however, each component garnered the five necessary votes for passage. Voting in favor of adding marital status to the ordinance were Dubs, Goode, Craig Tribken, Mary Rose Wilcox, and Williams. Voting in favor of referring the sexual orientation issue to the public were Barwood, Dubs, Nelson, Rimsza, and Williams. Only Dubs and Williams voted "yes" to both, implying that the combined measure might have failed on a 2-7 vote.

The Council Washes Its Hands

From the Council's perspective, at least it means that we will stop bugging them. Now, rather than setting the lesbian/gay community up for a series of encounters with the Council, the decision presumably forces us to gear up for a citywide campaign. It's not an impossible prospect, but one which will likely tie up energy and resources that could be spent elsewhere and in lesser amounts.

Was this in fact the goal of some of the council members who voted in favor of referring the issue to the electorate? Williams, Rimsza, Dubs, Barwood, and perhaps even Johnson (who nonetheless voted to keep the issue off the ballot) surely know that they are now election targets of the lesbian/gay community. (Barwood and Dubs will be up for re-election on the same ballot as the sexual-orientation measure, in September of 1993; Williams, Rimsza, and the mayor aren't up for re-election until 1995. John Nelson, the other "yes" vote, isn't running for re-election.) Some of them no doubt believe a citywide campaign on the sexual-orientation ballot measure will probably divert our community's resources away from revenge campaigns against recalcitrant council members.

The Good, The Bad, The Ugly

While it may be tidier to ascribe conspiratorial designs to this group, in fact, each member had a unique goal. It was just pure luck that the sum total resulted in our


community getting screwed.

Herewith, a brief and possibly accurate assessment of the council members' individual concerns:

- The Good: Craig Tribken, Mary Rose Wilcox, and Calvin Goode supported us the whole way. Goode led the charge during the previous six months, and Tribken and Wilcox were both eloquent in their statements against discrimination. Yes, Goode blundered by suggesting separate votes on the marital status inclusion and the sexual orientation referendum. Was it planned? Was Goode a co-conspirator? After all the shit he's taken on this issue, I would have a hard time believing that.
- The Bad: First-termers Frances Barwood and Kathy Dubs were probably not emotionally or intellectually equipped to deal objectively with this issue. Barwood, who has been the subject of some abuse, preferred to retreat, while clinging tenaciously to her opposition. Dubs may have started out with a clean slate and an open mind, but she insisted on taking the occasional ferocity of the lobbying effort personally. Her scolding of the lesbians and gay men in attendance at the June 16 council vote betrayed her true issue: the easy bruising of her sensibilities. (And we shouldn't forget her antipathy toward our ally, and her former election opponent, Linda Nadolski, who sponsored the original measure.) I don't think Dubs ever really tried to understand this issue. Maybe it's not possible for her.

Longtime councilman John Nelson, however, wasn't bad in the same sense of being inept. He has long staked out a position of limited government intervention in the private sector. While I can deplore his vote for the ballot measure, I can't say that he acted with any malice. He just happened to be bad for us on this one issue.


• The Ugly: Clearly, receiving gay support in an election and then derailing our No. 1 municipal issue constitutes ugly behavior indeed. Both Williams and Rimsza are guilty. Perhaps Williams honestly voted her conscience, and perhaps she really was misquoted by the *Arizona Republic*, which had her saying she remembered having only two gay supporters in her 1989 campaign (there were at least a dozen). More likely, she was covering her ass at our expense. Having just begun a four-year term, she was reportedly more concerned about a potential recall spearheaded by anti-gay ultraconservatives in her district than about a pro-gay backlash in her distant re-election bid. Whatever the reason, her cowardice has resulted in a huge task being dumped in our laps, a task that was hers and the council's ultimate responsibility. You're welcome, Thelda.

We were told back in '89 that Rimsza could not be trusted. But he sought our help and accepted our help. His behavior is also deplorable.

Finally, the mayor deserves some special attention. He complained to gay and lesbian lobbyists that he was being persecuted. He had come a long way, he insisted, for someone with his strict religious upbringing. This City Council has done more for gay rights (by approving last

December's compromise measure which banned anti-gay discrimination in city hiring) than had all the previous city councils, he said.

But Johnson has said some other things, as well. He stood up last January at a Martin Luther King Jr. Day event and declaimed—in front of Bob Aronin, Rosa Parks, God, and everybody—that he was a tireless champion of civil rights. He didn't say, "Except when it impacts small business." He didn't say, "I'm for civil rights, but I don't think that government should get involved"—as he said recently to many gay activists.

The mayor should have either admitted that his stirring MLK speech was just empty rhetoric—or he should have acted in accordance with his stated convictions. This apparent hypocrisy largely explains why the lesbian/gay community now regards Paul Johnson with such contempt. Forget that Johnson is a Democratic officeholder, because he surely has. He rarely acts like one, except when it comes to using his status as a big-city mayor to grab a spot in the Arizona delegation to the Democratic National Convention in New York City. (As I left a meeting with Johnson on the day before the fateful Council vote, I said, "See you in New York." I meant it cordially; I hope it didn't sound too ominous.)

Next: The Beginning

There are basically two things that can happen now. The first and most likely is that the sexual orientation issue will go to a public vote in the city of Phoenix as scheduled. The community will be required to wage a potentially expensive campaign. And the outcome will probably have most to do with factors we can't control, like the media spin. (God help us if NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue issues an opinion.)

Or, one of the council members who voted in favor of the referendum can move to reconsider his or her vote, and the Council could vote again. This is unlikely. We've learned in Arizona that when you give the public the opportunity to vote on something, you sure as hell better not take it back. The Arizona Legislature learned that lesson with the King holiday, as the Phoenix City Council is well aware.

One thing's almost for certain. A citywide campaign on this issue will be many times uglier and more contentious than the just-finished City Council campaign. It will require our community to redouble its already precedent-shattering effort.

Many complain that there is no lesbian/gay "community" in Phoenix. Is this the genesis?



the gay 80s

Gay Pride month lends itself to retrospectives of queer culture, usually highlighting our spartan political victories and dramatizing our mistreatment at the hands of hets. In his just-released book, *The Gay Decades* (Plume, \$12.00), author Leigh Rutledge plumbs the perverse and political and comes up with hunks of homo history from the Sixties, Seventies, and Eighties. In this excerpt, Rutledge poses the queer query: Where were we in the Go-Go Eighties, and what were we doing?

September 20, 1980 The Saint—a cavernous, members-only gay disco featuring nearly 2,000 revolving lights, a massive centerpiece planetarium projector, a 76-foot-high dome over the dance floor, and a sprawling balcony area meant for intimate sexual encounters—opens in New York City. Within a few short weeks, nearly 3,000 men have paid \$250 to join, and an inexhaustible waiting list has been established.

November 22, 1980 Mae West dies in Los Angeles at the age of eighty-eight. Contrary to rumors that have been circulating for years, she is *not*, after her death, revealed to have been a man masquerading all those years as a woman.

September 18, 1981 *Mommie Dearest*, starring Faye Dunaway as a demented and not-quite-so-motherly Joan Crawford, opens at movie theaters across the country, making the lines "No more wire hangers!" and "Don't fuck with me, fellas—this ain't my first time at the rodeo!" instant camp classics, especially among gay men. Within months, midnight showings of the film (in the tradition of *The Rocky Horror Picture Show*) are springing up around the country: audience members often show up dressed as Crawford and arm themselves with scrub brushes, cans of tile cleaner, pruning shears, and, of course, wire hangers. Several years later, Dunaway acknowledges that her performance in the film was high camp, and confides to an interviewer that her decision to play the role was probably a major career mistake.

February 25, 1982 Wisconsin becomes the first state in the U.S. to enact a statewide gay rights statute.

July 9, 1982 *Miami Herald* headline: 'GAY PLAGUE' SHOWING UP AMONG HAITIAN REFUGEES

August 3, 1982 Twenty-eight-year-old Atlantan Michael Hardwick is arrested on sodomy charges after police—trying to serve a warrant for a minor traffic violation—show up at his home and find him in bed performing fellatio on a male companion. "I'm in bed with this guy," says Hardwick later, "and I hear the door to my room open. A little later, I look up, and there's a man standing over us in full police drag. My first thought was, *This can't be happening!*"

Hardwick is thrown into jail for twelve hours after his arrest, and the resulting court case—over the constitutionality of Georgia's sodomy laws—becomes a *cause célèbre* in the gay community, culminating in an appeal of Hardwick's conviction to the Supreme Court in 1986.

August 26, 1982 The first national television special on AIDS—*AIDS: The Mysterious Disease*—appears on PBS.

October 14, 1982 Twenty-three-year-old Scott Thorson files a \$13-million "palimony" suit against Liberace, claiming that he and the pianist "lived together as man and wife" for more than six years. Thorson—who worked as Liberace's chauffeur and sometimes escorted the entertainer onstage during concerts—later agrees to a \$95,000 settlement (as well as a Rolls-Royce and several dogs) from Liberace.

December 31, 1982 Number of stories on AIDS published in *The New York Times* this year: five. Number of stories the *Times* ran on the Rubik's Cube: nine. On the problems of panda fertility: thirteen. On dog care: forty-eight.

January 11, 1984 The staid and often homophobic *Wall Street Journal* deems that staff writers may now use the word "gay" as a synonym for "homosexual" in their articles and headlines.

July 13, 1984 *Brothers*—a weekly sitcom about three Philadelphia brothers, one of whom is gay—premieres on the Showtime cable TV network. The series—created and written by veterans of such mainstream shows as *Cheers* and *Taxi*—was rejected three years earlier by NBC. Although the show will quickly establish a loyal gay following, it is the high-flying performance of Philip Charles MacKenzie as the fey and irrepressible "Donald" that keeps it going for several years, even after the scripts have turned a bit mawkish and anemic.

insisted that his recent weight loss (more than twenty-five pounds) and shocking pallor were the result of a misguided new health regime, consisting almost exclusively of eating watermelon.

Four days later, the pianist is buried in Forest Lawn Cemetery, in a six-foot white marble sarcophagus embellished with his name in brass on the lid. The grave itself is flanked by two candelabra-shaped trees.

March 7, 1988 The incomparable Divine—reaping the career rewards of his first solid mainstream success in the just-released hit *Hairspray*—dies of heart disease in Los Angeles at the age of forty-two.

December 28, 1988 A district court judge orders that quadriplegic Sharon Kowalski be moved from the nursing home where her father has placed her (and where she is, according to evaluations, not receiving the rehabilitative therapy she needs) and that she be allowed to receive visits from her lover, Karen Thompson (who has not seen her in more than three years), as well as other lesbian friends. The ruling does not, however, countermand her father's guardianship.

June 23, 1989 An op-ed piece by Samuel Lipman in *The New York Times* praises the Corcoran Gallery's decision to cancel the Robert Mapplethorpe exhibit, and claims that "the lives of our children" are being undermined by "Morally unacceptable" art. He dismisses Mapplethorpe's work as "a few raunchy photographs."

July 26, 1989 Jesse Helms leads a fight in the U.S. Senate to curtail NEA funding for "obscene or indecent art," including artworks that depict "sadomasochism, homoeroticism, the exploitation of children, or individuals engaged in sex acts." The measure is overwhelmingly adopted by a voice vote. Anne Murphy, executive director of the American Arts Alliance, notes that under the new restrictions, "We couldn't produce most of Shakespeare. Certainly not *Richard III*."

"If America persists in the way it's going," says Helms, "and the Lord doesn't strike us down, He ought to apologize to Sodom and Gomorrah."

October 6, 1989 The NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt returns to Washington, D.C. It has grown from the initial 1,920 panels in 1987 to 10,848.

December 10, 1989 More than five thousand activists show up in front of New York's St. Patrick's Cathedral to protest the Catholic Church's policies on homosexuality and AIDS. When several of the protesters enter the cathedral—where John Cardinal O'Connor is conducting mass—and begin chaining themselves to pews and shouting anti-Catholic slogans, police move in and begin making arrests.

"We will not be silent!" cries one demonstrator as the police haul him off. "We will fight O'Connor's bigotry!" Meanwhile, protesters outside continue carrying signs, "CARDINAL O'CONNOR: PUBLIC HEALTH MENACE," while chanting "You say 'Don't fuck,' we say 'Fuck you!'" More than a hundred demonstrators—including forty-three inside the cathedral—are eventually arrested.



September 24, 1984 A New York psychiatrist expresses his belief that AIDS is caused by depression, brought on by an internalization of all the negative messages coming from groups like the Moral Majority.

January 1, 1985 "It's the ultimate mind-fuck, in some ways even better than reality. It's what I call wash-and-wear sex. It doesn't require small talk, or putting your trick into a cab afterwards. You get exactly what you want. It's like television; you can turn it on and turn it off, in the privacy of your own home at any hour of the day or night." —Los Angeles owner of one of the many, suddenly flourishing gay phone sex companies

October 22, 1986 Surgeon General C. Everett Koop releases a statement saying, "The threat of AIDS should be sufficient to permit a sex education curriculum...There is no doubt that we need sex education in schools and that it include information on heterosexual and homosexual relationships...The need is critical and the price of neglect is high. The lives of our young depend on our fulfilling our responsibility."

February 4, 1987 Two weeks after publicists denied a *Las Vegas Sun* story claiming he had AIDS, Liberace, sixty-two, dies from the disease, in Palm Springs, California. Spokesmen for the entertainer had earlier

Having already explored sexual politics in his films *Caravaggio* and *Sebastiane*, filmmaker Derek Jarman is interpreting historical theater in his latest mini-epic, *Edward II*. Based on Christopher Marlowe's classic history play, Jarman's film is a faggoty account of obsessive love and barbarous revenge.

Recalling the train of events which led to the downfall of King Edward (Steve Waddington) and his boyfriend, Piers Gaveston (Andrew Tiernan), *Edward II* provides a very different—and strikingly homoerotic—sort of history compared to Shakespeare's semi-official accounts of the Tudor dynasty.

"There's been a long tradition of denying the homosexual side of the relationship between Edward and Gaveston," Jarman says. "Making this film is about reclaiming our history."

HER OWN KIND

"Male artists are always doing nude studies of their wives or girlfriends," according to Annie Lopez. "I always wanted to do a show on men."

Lopez' current exhibition at downtown MARS Gallery, "Men/Man/Boy," is a collection of photographic studies of her husband, artist Jeff Falk, and their three-year-old son, Adam. While Lopez' show displays masculine imagery, her focus is ultimately on cultural diversity and the differences between "brown people" (like the artist) and Anglos (her photographic subjects here).

"My parents saw doing Mexican things as a step down," Lopez says of her interest in Anglicization. "On the other hand, white people used to say to me, 'You should stick to your own kind.'"

"Men/Man/Boy" includes a mixed-media installation called "I Once Had a Chicano Boyfriend or: Why I Married a White Guy" that incorporates Mexican cultural souvenirs with a wedding cake of flour tortillas. A poem Lopez wrote called "I Was Once a Chicana Babe in a Lowrider Car Club" ("He said he loved me, but he only loved his car...") details her hasty escape from *Cholo* culture.

Lopez' work portrays tough topics in an affectionate, humorous manner. About her erotic photos of her naked husband she laughs, "These were done out of love, not lust." And about her indictment of her lowrider lover, Lopez says, "I could fill three museums with the wrongs white men have done me."
