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CARDIOVASCULAR LABORATORY

March 29, 1985

To Whom It May Concern:

Mr. James E. Rodgers has been a patient of ours at the Good Samaritan Medical Center Cardiovascular Clinic since March, 1981. He sustained a serious heart attack at that time, and underwent heart bypass surgery. Unfortunately, progressive deterioration of his heart has occurred to the point where his activity is minimal. He is limited by weakness, shortness of breath, and frequent hospitalizations. Mr. Rodgers is not expected to live much longer.

We referred him to Doctor Jack Copeland of the University of Arizona in Tucson, one of the leaders in the field of heart transplantation. Mr. Rodgers was accepted as a candidate for transplantation. Unfortunately Medicare, his insurance carrier, does not yet pay for heart transplants.

James will have to rely on your generosity to obtain sufficient funds so that surgery can proceed. He has established an account at the Tempe Broadway Branch of the Valley National Bank to hold these funds. In the unfortunate circumstance of James' death before sufficient funds are raised, the proceeds will be held for a future heart transplant candidate needing private funds.

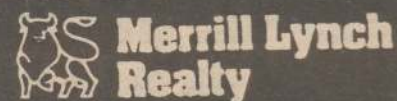

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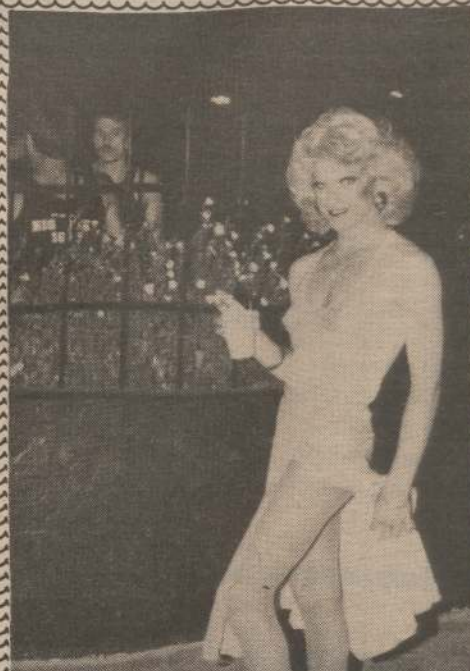
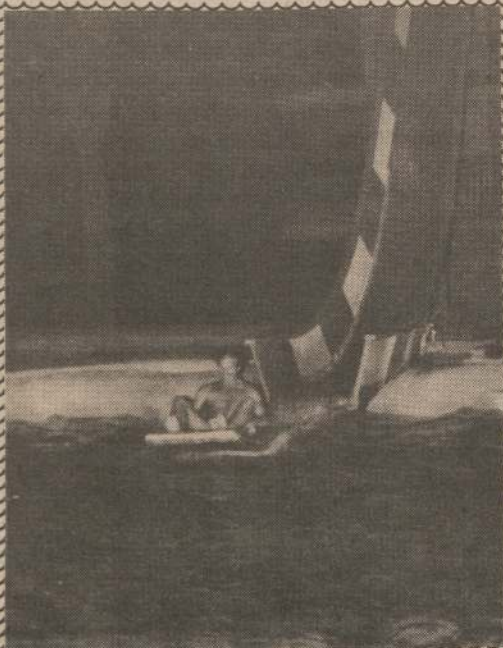
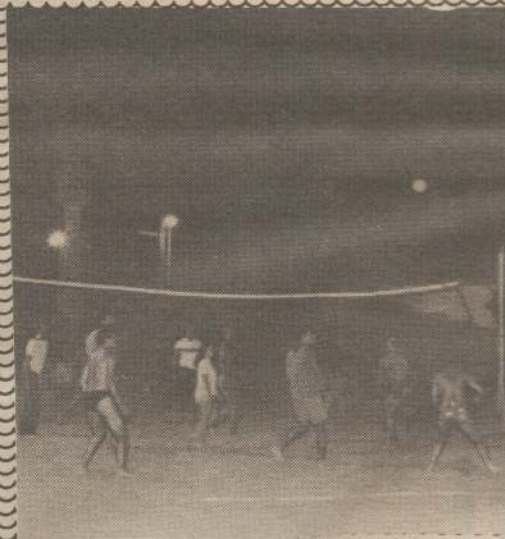


TROPICAL FEVER AT BIG SURF MAKES BIG SPLASH

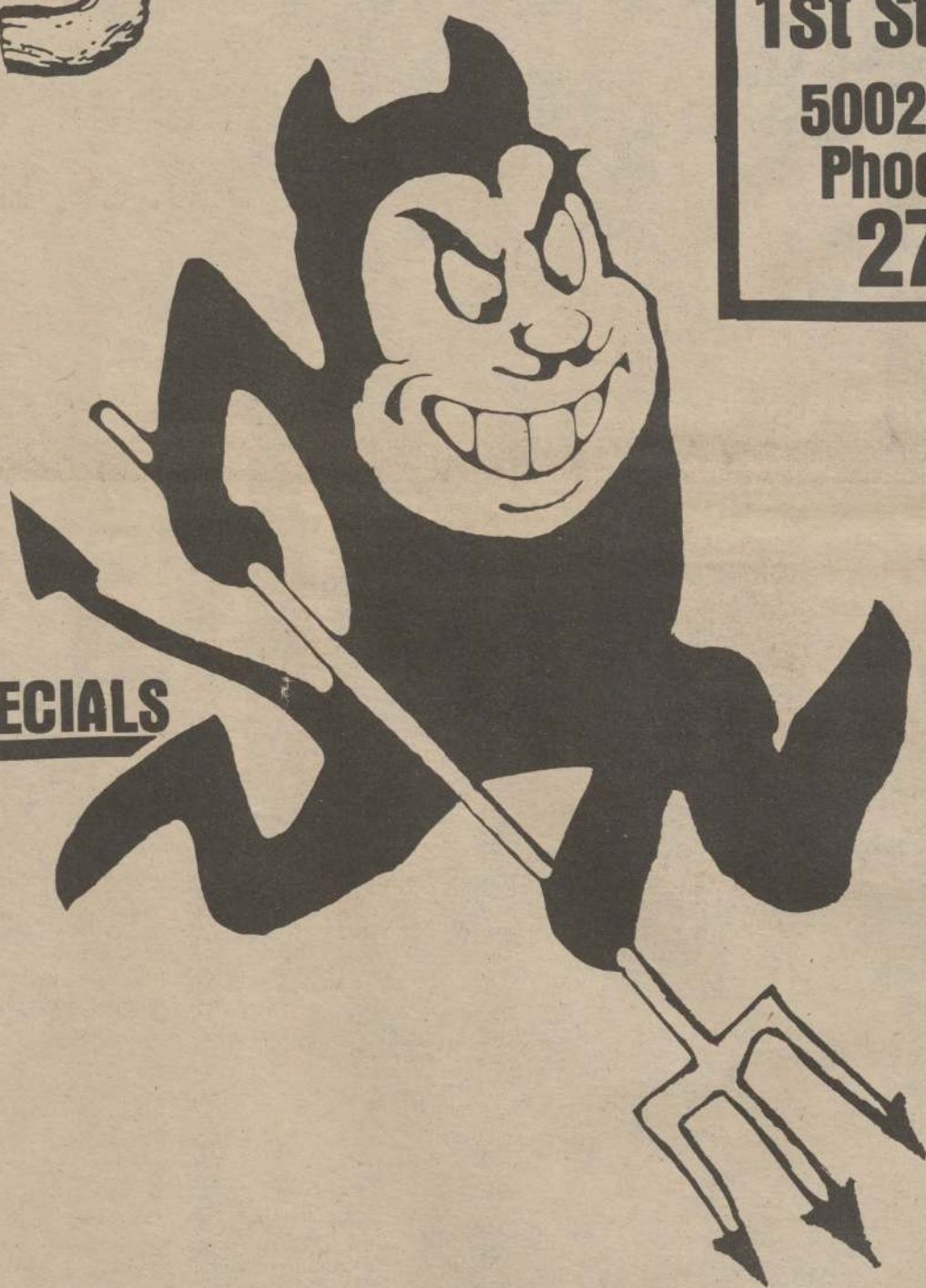

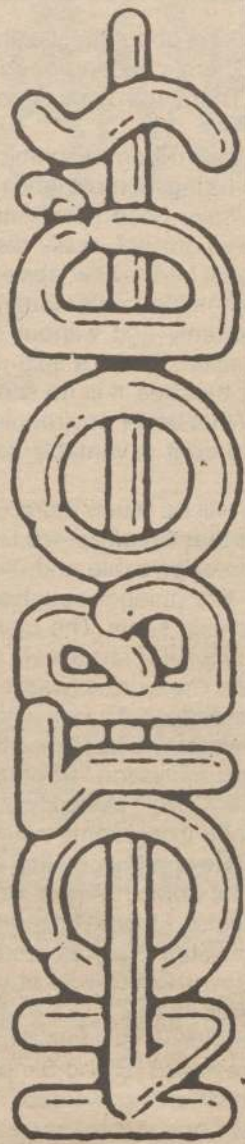

MICHAEL GREER vs. PHOENIX (A COMIC COLLISION)

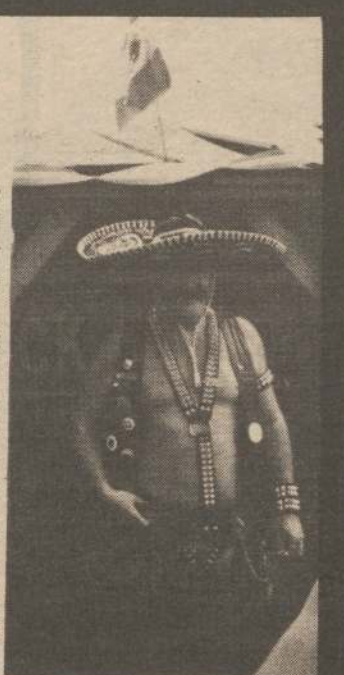

— P.R. ENTERTAINMENT REVIEW —

"Seen any good movies lately?" (It beats talking about the weather.)

"There just isn't anything worth seeing". "There's nothing good out right now". "I think there's something on cable this week". "There aren't any decent musicals being made". "Is Mel Gibson in anything showing?"

Those are just a few of the replies I have heard from discriminating friends and acquaintances. A cursory glance at the local listings almost lends credence to their observations. In brief moments of despair I have been heard muttering the same misgivings. But the feeling passes quickly — I am not easily discouraged. A true 'cinema junkie' isn't dissuaded by an occasional bad review, absence of star names, or the claustrophobia of showplaces that resemble cattle chutes at a rodeo. The insidious need for a 'film fix' can strike suddenly and without notice. When that happens I blindly dash off to the closest location. Given a little more time to think about it I consider the offerings of the bigger theatres. It is no secret that I will view practically anything if it is at the Cine Capri. What better environment can be found? Good sound, nice big screen, and curtains to boot. A veritable oasis — soon to be surrounded by highrise office buildings.

After just such a visit I must confess that I will be much more circumspect in the future. I can happily inform the unwary public that *Creature* — a film full of unknown faces and produced by an assortment of unrecognizable and alien (pun intended) names — has disappeared down the drain like phlegm coughed up the morning after. I like good science fiction. I don't like cheap shots. The aforementioned *Alien* was successfully thrilling because of what was *not* shown — as well as for the splendid cast of actors and the intriguing sets. *Creature* is (was) a direct rip-off with none of the redeeming qualities. Damn the torpedoes. To Hell with characterization. What need for plot or continuity of script when the screen can be filled with a veritable graveyard (spaceship) of ghouls and mutilation. To paraphrase Katherine Hepburn in *On Golden Pond* — "Gore, Gore, Gore!" (Actually, what she said was "Bore, Bore, Bore!") I can tolerate a certain amount of graphic violence if the situation deserves it. Gratuitous buckets of ketchup are another matter entirely. Heads fly. People are munched on like so many buffet tidbits. (A few of the middle-aged couples in attendance got up and left the theatre. I haven't seen that happen since John Cassavettes fumbled around on screen with Peter Falk and friends.) Come to think of it — this flick should have been shown exclusively at your local outdoor movie arena. And Joe Bob Briggs should check it out.

No sooner had I recovered from that experience when I found myself venturing off to the Los Arcos theatre to see the recently released "Blood Simple". The title alone made me extremely wary but someone told me it was good and I need little encouragement where movies are concerned. I knew none of the pertinent details about this film when I saw it. It is a 'small' film — produced, directed and written by two brothers (Ethan and Joel Coens). This is their first venture into movie-making. It eventually took European interest to get this film distributed. (Europeans love slow, little movies.) The setting is a rural Texas town. The story involves a bar owner, his wife, her lover, and the sleazy character hired by the bar owner to kill them. The film is slow to get started and the pace quickens only marginally as it goes on. The dialogue and action are sparingly woven into this imaginatively photographed 'film noir'. There is violence. There is blood. But it's filmed in such a fashion that I could view it all through the detached lens of the camera. Reflecting on it as a whole I would have to admit that I am glad I saw it. The story has enough twists in it to satisfy the average patron with a little patience. The acting is consistent. There are at least two scenes so explicitly unnerving that I will carry them around in my head for some time to come. "Blood Simple" isn't for everyone. But it is a small film that makes a definite impression.

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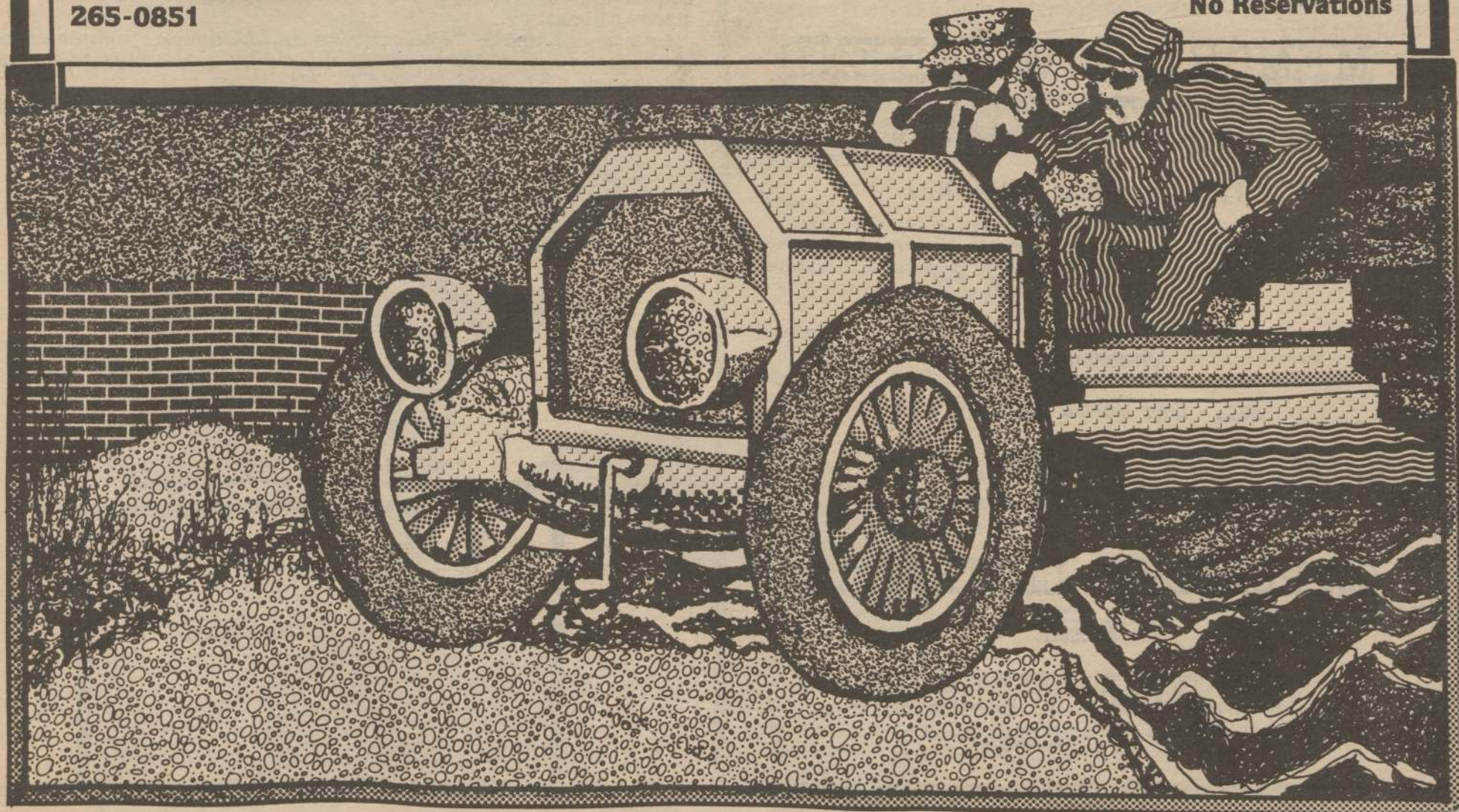

LEATHERNOTES

Boy! Is it hot in Phoenix! And the weather is pretty warm, too. As the temperature climbs each year we start getting phone calls from out-of-state visitors asking where to go in our fair city to find the leather crowd. Well, at 100° you're not going to find too many guys in leather pants and chaps. It is understandable to an extent. But if you enjoy leather, with some investment you can pick up many items that will provide hot weather comfort. The body harness can be worn all year long. Variations on the harness are many. For those with a slender build the harness should be made with narrow straps. The straps over the shoulder and around the chest should range from 3/4 to 1 1/4 inch. A down strap to the cock ring can be added in either the same width or wider. The down strap can also be made to snap so the harness can be worn with or without it. A fuller torso, a stockier build, can handle wider straps. Normally 1 1/4 to 2 inch straps. Stud work can be added to dress up the harness if desired. For the masculine appearance usually looked for in a harness the stud work should be kept simple. Harness can either buckle or snap. It is simply a matter of taste. One design is the same as another. Buckles are a little bulkier than snaps and generally work better on a fuller torso. The leather used in constructing the harness can be light weight for more comfort in the heat.

Vests are also year 'round items. From the basic bar vest to more tailored, detailed vests, worn with or without a shirt, they can be worn in any weather. Leather comes in a variety of weights. Chaps for example usually run 4 to 5 oz. per square foot. For tank tops, tee shirts and shorts in cow skin a 1/2 to 1 oz. leather is used. Extremely flexible and soft, it is called plange, and is ideal for summer wear. Other leathers used for summer are Cabretta, a goat skin that is very cool and comfortable to wear. Cabretta is a porous material that breathes allowing the body heat to escape through the skin. Pig skin is also good for high temperatures and is somewhat more durable than Cabretta.

Tee shirts can be made sleeved or sleeveless, crew neck or v-neck, zippered on the side or square cut for a slip on. Tank tops can be scoop neck or traditional, deep cut in the arm holes or a tighter fit. Both can be made form-fitting and in the newer style cuts that are looser fitting.

Shorts can also be made in the summer leathers. Full shorts are built like the upper portion of a pair of jeans. Complete with pockets, fly, belt loops they look just like pants. Jogging shorts are built with a draw string or an elastic waistband. Vented on the side for freedom of movement. Variations on the same idea are lacing on the sides, snapped fly, or—for the more daring—a snap off pouch. Here again these can be made skin tight or in a looser fit.

Armbands, wristbands, leather caps, leather suspenders all can be worn all year. But don't put your pants and chaps away for the summer. Manmade, woven materials absorb the perspiration from your body making you feel cooler. Leather does not absorb the sweat. Talc powder or baby powder rubbed through the crotch and down the legs before putting on your leather will keep you much cooler as it absorbs the sweat.

For those of us who like the heat, enjoy the clean, fresh sweat of a man in leather and are turned on by the feel of sweat running from one body to the next—any time is leather time. Enjoy.

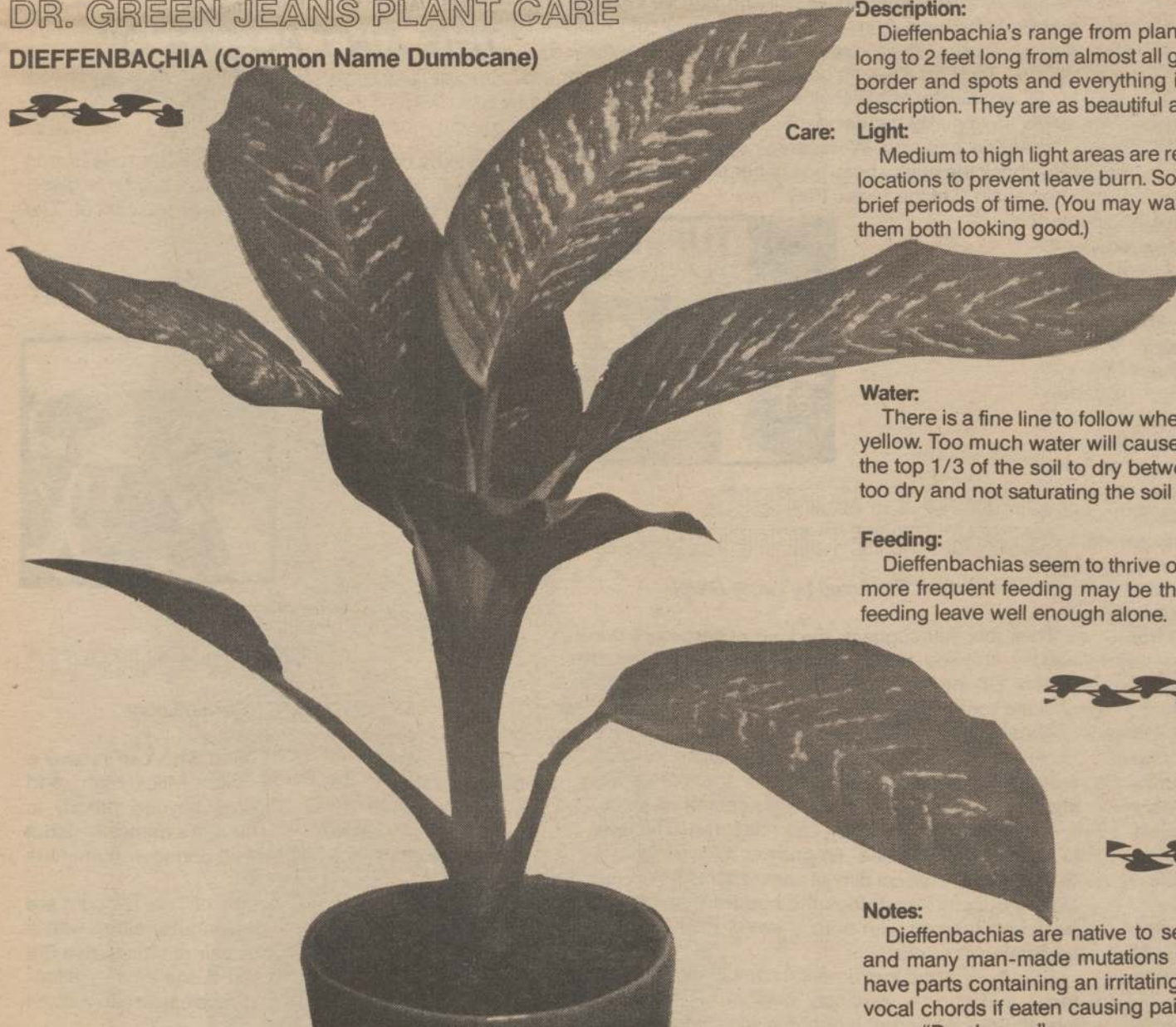

DR. GREEN JEANS PLANT CARE

DIEFFENBACHIA (Common Name Dumbcane)



Description:

Dieffenbachia's range from plants 8" tall to 83" tall. Their leaves range from 1 inch long to 2 feet long from almost all green with white spots to almost all white with green border and spots and everything in between. So it's kind of difficult to pin down "A" description. They are as beautiful as they are varied.

Care: Light:

Medium to high light areas are required for best color and appearance. Avoid full sun locations to prevent leave burn. Some dieffenbachias can be used in low light areas for brief periods of time. (You may want to rotate two plants from low to high light to keep them both looking good.)

Water:

There is a fine line to follow when watering. Too little water will cause lower leaves to yellow. Too much water will cause rotting. The way I approach this problem is to allow the top 1/3 of the soil to dry between watering. This way you're not letting the soil get too dry and not saturating the soil with water.

Feeding:

Dieffenbachias seem to thrive on a *little* bit more fertilizer than most house plants so more frequent feeding may be the plan — but if your plant is doing well on regular feeding leave well enough alone.

Notes:

Dieffenbachias are native to several areas including Costa Rica, Columbia, Brazil and many man-made mutations have appeared in Florida nurseries. Dieffenbachias have parts containing an irritating juice that causes swelling of the mouth, throat and vocal chords if eaten causing pain and temporary loss of speech. Thus, the common name "Dumbcane."



PRINCE AND THE REVOLUTION "AROUND THE WORLD IN A DAY"

(Warner Bros; Produced by Prince)

Comment on Prince's material has always been arduous; his records have rendered useless any debate concerning style or craft.

However, his self-proclaimed Royal Badness has perpetually offered one constant: self indulgence. And while by now seemingly impossible, Prince and entourage have outdone themselves in this latest Prince-as-God installment.

Prince, of course, can break jail on this premise, realizing that his tight musicianship is ultimate foundation for such divine proclamation.

Around the World in a Day delivers the quintessential innuendo and innumerable references to all things purple. With these well-trodden thematic paths, Prince and Co. are covering their footsteps with the barely inventive decorum of Psychedelic Revival. So, while much of the music here bears the Starr Co. stamp, it is modified in such a manner as to appear novel (if not actually acid-drenched).

Granted, this newly-embraced neo-paisley funk is a novelty which does not, in its frequent lyrical contradiction, wear well after repeated listening. Mainly, it is the album's aborted effort at Far Eastern allusion that stands in the way of its being more than the usually enjoyable Prince fare. What's all this about ladders and see-saws? And how can we take this project seriously as a spaced-out psychedelic with its anti-drug and love-over-sex anthems ("Pop Life," "Temptation")?

Taken song by song, and less the psychedelic trappings, "Around the World" is pretty pleasing. It is only Prince's imperious thematic stumblings which weigh the album down.

Let's hope our Prince finds his ladder. Perhaps he'll use it to climb down from his high horse.

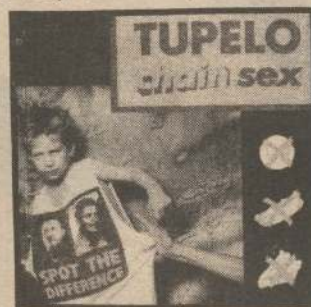
SHANNON "DO YOU WANNA GET AWAY"

(Mirage/Emergency; Produced by Mark Liggett and Chris Barbosa)

Shannon's 1984 debut LP was certainly one of last year's Big Surprises, offering as it did three big dance floor hits ("Give Me Tonight," "My Heart's Divided," and the ground-breaking "Let the Music Play") and not a few really tight LP cuts.

Unfortunately, "Do You Wanna Get Away" suffers the dreaded Sophomore Jinx. The wonderfully energetic call-and-response of the title cut and a tweaked-out "Urgent" (do we really need a hip-hop Foreigner re-make?) are about all that's worthwhile here. Liggett and Barbosa have ostensibly expended a great lot of energy altering their own much-quoted "Shannon Sound." Too bad. They've gone so far out of their way in an attempt to establish their premiere artist as a singer as to nullify her decidedly minimal merits.

Shannon can sing. Who cares? Let her producers bring back the quirky beat-box of her earlier work and once again "Let the Music Play."



TUPELO.CHAIN SEX "SPOT THE DIFFERENCE"

(Selma; Produced by Limey Dave)

Their moniker suggests the kind of hard-core punk usually cranked out by bands with equally bizarre names. On the contrary, TCS owes little to the school of skate-rock/thrash-dance.

These boys are about more lasting sounds, musicaly. An unusually compatible combination of guitar, mandolin, drums and violin make for some of the most stylistically varied sounds currently caught on vinyl.

Case in point is the jazzy, Latin-flavored "The Revolution Will Be Televised" (in answer, apparently, to Gil Scot-Heron's political ditty of some years back). Limey Dave's punchy vocal rides the chug-a-lugging drum beat, interspersed with both a sweet violin riff and a screaming sax solo.

Effectively weird instrumental combinations such as these make for a startlingly original LP by a band whose unique approach ought to sustain them — and their listeners — for quite some time.

"SHARPSHOOTER" TARA DONOVAL

(Mozart Midnight Records)

Strong musical hooks and appealing production; pop-flavored cover of Laura Branigan's original (from the "Body Rock" soundtrack).

"THIS AIN'T NO DISCO" THE FLAMING BLATTS

(Twin-Tone Import)

Not to be confused with Talking Head's "Life During Wartime," at 132 BPM this most certainly is disco. Graceful synthetics, frantic vocals reminiscent of "The Crazy Family."



THE THOUGHT "THE THOUGHT"

(MCA; Produced by Craig Leon)

Any self-contained synth band who can record a cover version of the Byrds "Eight Miles High" and succeed in conveying anything beyond parody is worth a second listen. The Thought's domestic debut happily deserves — and holds up during — numerous re-playings.

The lovely, haunting melodies of The Thought are reminiscent of early Flock of Seagulls, albeit with a more positive lyrical attitude. A pair of sixties-stye Brit rockers ("Maggie MacColl" and "Lone Wolf" — effectively capture the spirit of that musical wave, without sounding dated.

An amiable, stylish record from a diverse personnel.



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MADONNA: CRAZY FOR WHOM?

A few years ago, a friend of mine took to wearing lengths of electrical cord around her wrists and odd scraps of cloth in her hair. "Why," I questioned her, "do you want to dress like some unknown disco diva?" "Because," she answered, "*Nobody* dresses like this."

My fourteen-year-old niece sports a dangling crucifix from her left earlobe. A half-dozen cocoa-bead rosaries around her neck. A fluorescent rag tied in your strategically uncombed locks. "Why," I ask her, "do you dress like Madonna?" "Because *everybody* dresses like this," comes her reply.

And so it is. From *Nobody* to *Everybody*, from "Everybody," the first single (and hardly a certifiable hit, way back when), to a string of top tens and an enormous lot of teenaged followers decked out like -luded out nuns. Madonna.

Phoenix' own branch of -luded out nuns (less the -ludes) turned out en masse for Madonna's May 7th Great Big Bimbo Extravaganza, wearing an accumulated 7,000 pounds of junk jewelry and their best Salvation Army chic. Among the dolled up Boy Toys at ASU Activity Center, with niece in tow ("Do I look alright? Can we go *backstage*?") I attempted to look distracted and business-like.

Up there on stage, Madonna skipped about, singing and giggling and teasing her predominantly teenaged audience. And when it became apparent that some of what we were hearing was pre-recorded ("Do these kids realize they're listening to Playback?" I wondered "Do they care?") I reminded myself that this show was neither professing nor offering music as art. Instead, this was a convergence of the In Crowd; the coolest gathering of the Most In. Madonna, as we all know, is terribly In.

Considering this, I could not resist rather smug recollections of Madonna before she was The New Thing. Madonna as just another musical proposition, another record destined to collect dust in record bins everywhere. Remembering what everyone else seemed to forget: that Madonna is *not* an overnight success story.

Initially, Madonna's first LP was a dud. Four months of incessant rotation in the record shop where I was employed resulted in few sales, fewer questions about "who is that on the turntable?!" and the resignation of one clerk ("I cannot bear to hear 'Borderline' one more time," he told me as he tendered his two week's notice). Six months later, "Holiday" was a hit (the *third* single, following "Everybody" and "Physical Attraction") whereby I threw out my play copy of "Madonna" and tripled my orders on same. Almost a year after its release, the album was selling. The rest, as they say, is history.

Or, more accurately, Her Story. The story of an ambitious if not hugely talented girl from Michigan who made it Big with a pleasantly innocuous bag full of hits.

Madonna performed these hits for an enthusiastic Phoenix crowd, backed by both live musicians and the aforementioned pre-recordings. "Burning Up," "Holiday," "Like a Virgin," "Crazy For You." She treated us to "Into the Groove" from "Desperately Seeking Susan." She shimmied, she winked, she wore cute clothes, she gave us everything we came for in a well-rehearsed, slick little performance. She even thanked us for coming.

After the show, Madonna was *not* speaking to anyone. This reporter included.

But that was okay. She had made the long trek from Nowhere to Everywhere. She had helped rejuvenate disco music in the U.S. and she had just given us one hell of a nice little show.

She could be bitchy if she wanted.

"Easier said than done" is a given, here. All the same, Covina says, "Go For It!"

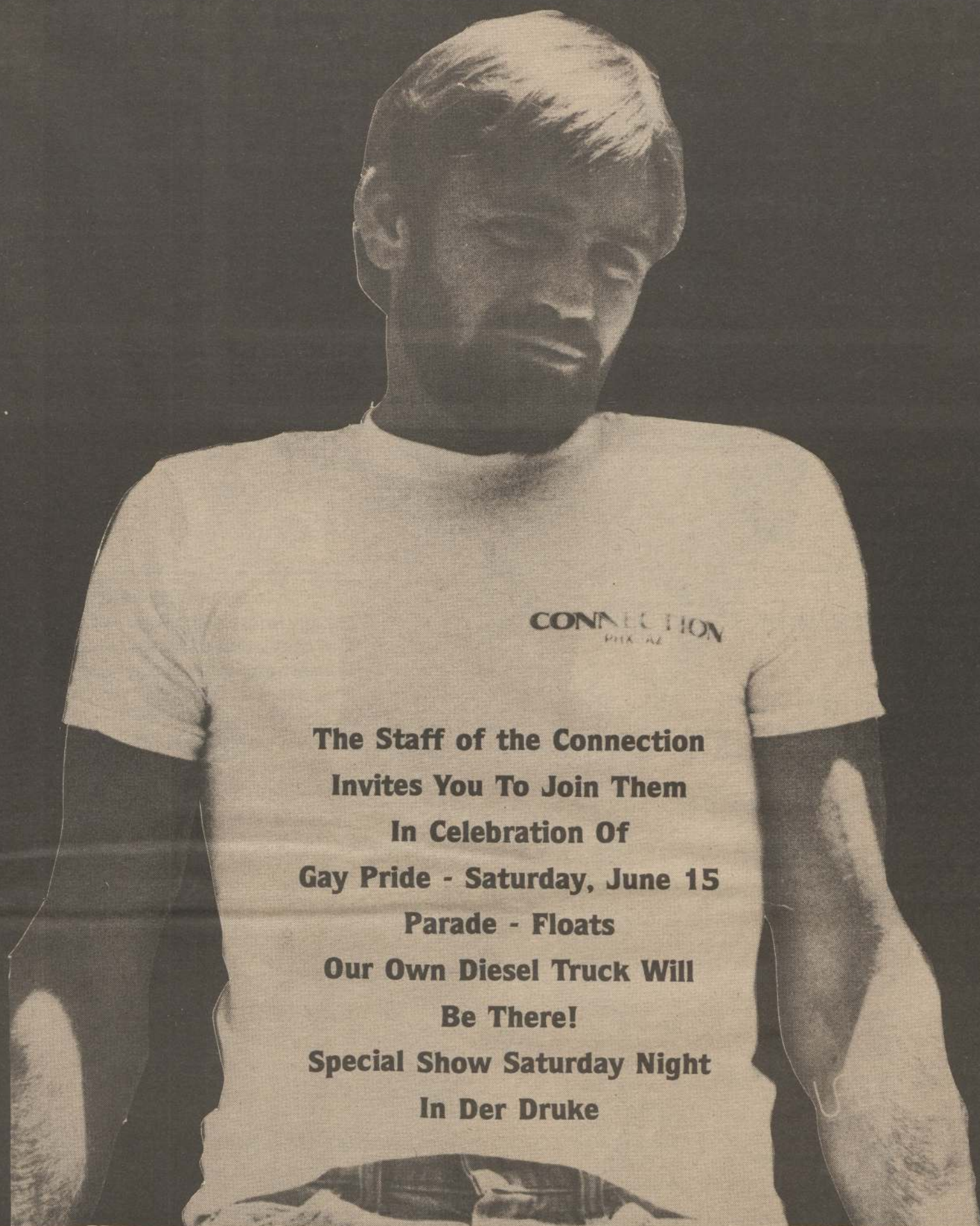
